Preface

The Alaska Population Overview is a portrait of the state's ever-changing population. Population numbers presented here are for residents as defined by the U.S. Census Bureau. The Census Bureau uses the concept of "usual residence" (self-reported) to determine where people are counted. Unlike the definition used for Permanent Fund Dividend eligibility, there is no requirement that a person live in Alaska for a specific amount of time before being considered a resident.

The Alaska Department of Labor and Workforce Development's Research and Analysis Section, or R&A, prepares population estimates annually for all boroughs, census areas, cities, and census-designated places in Alaska as well as for certain special areas, such as school districts and Alaska Native regional corporations. These estimates are used for a range of purposes, including research and planning, distribution of resources by public and private agencies, and updating population projections.

This edition of Alaska Population Overview consists of four chapters that include population estimates for the state and its boroughs, census areas, and places for each year from 2011 through 2015. This overview also contains information from the 2010 Census and uses the same population concepts and definitions that the U.S. Census Bureau uses.

Development of Estimates

The population estimates begin with data from the last decennial census (2010), with adjustments for known errors in the census and post-census changes in geography. For each year following the last census, we create the latest series of post-census population estimates, or "vintage," by using or revising administrative data that indicate population change. These data include Permanent Fund Dividend applications, military and group quarters surveys and research, and a state

total household population estimate from the U.S. Census Bureau. After release of data from the subsequent decennial census (e.g., Census 2010 for the 2001 to 2009 estimates), we make final adjustments for the intercensal years.

Each year, we update historical population data for the current decade, so users should take time series information from the most recent overview or from the Research and Analysis Section's Web site (laborstats.alaska.gov) rather than adding the current estimate to those published previously.

Executive Overview

State Population Estimate

The July 1, 2015 population of Alaska was 737,625 and represented 0.2 percent of the national population. Fifty-two percent of the population was male, and 48 percent was female. Between July 2014 and July 2015, Alaska's total population remained essentially unchanged.

Age

Alaska's median age was 34.5 in 2015 — somewhat younger than the national median of 37.8. (See Figure 1.5 and Table 1.11.) The population of Alaskans age 65 or older was 74,853, representing 10 percent of the state. The school age population (children ages 5 to 17) of Alaska was 135,144, or 18 percent. Areas with larger percentages of Alaska Natives were generally younger.

Race and Ethnicity

As of July 1, 2015, Alaska's population was 15 percent Alaska Native or American Indian, 67 percent white, 6 percent Asian, 4 percent African American, 1 percent Native Hawaiian or other Pacific Islander, and 7 percent multirace. (See Figure 1.4.) Seven percent of Alaskans were of Hispanic origin. Boroughs and census areas in northern and western Alaska had larger proportions of Alaska Natives. (See Figure 2.6.)

Migration

Migration is the most unpredictable component of population change. Between 2014 and 2015, Alaska's high migration rates continued, with 39,549 migrating into the state and 46,323 migrating out, for a net migration loss of 6,774 people. (See Table 1.2.) Relatively small shifts in migration to or from Alaska can have major effects on net migration. The Matanuska-Susitna Borough led the state in growth due to net migration. (See Figure 2.5.)

Births and Deaths

From 2014 to 2015, 11,327 babies were born in Alaska. That's a birth rate of 1.5 per 100 people, compared to 1.2 per 100 for the nation as a whole. Alaska had 4,282 deaths, which is a relatively small number for the size of our population and in line with our population's relatively young age. (See Table 1.1.)

Population Centers

Eighty percent of Alaska's population lived in places with populations of 2,500 or more in 2015. (See Figure 4.1 and Table 4.1.) Cities with more than 10,000 people included the Municipality of Anchorage (298,908), the City and Borough of Juneau (33,277), and the City of Fairbanks (32,116). These three areas were home to nearly 50 percent of Alaska's population.

The five boroughs in the state with the largest populations made up 80 percent of the state in 2015. These included Anchorage as well as the Matanuska-Susitna Borough (100,178 people), Fairbanks North Star Borough (98,645), Kenai Peninsula Borough (57,763), and City and Borough of Juneau. (See Table 2.1.)

Households

Alaska had 264,184 households in 2015, and the average size was 2.7 people. Thirty-six percent of households had one or more people under age 18, and 21 percent had one or more people age 65 or older. (See Table 1.5.)

Group Quarters

The group quarters population comprises those living in dwellings other than households and includes shared housing such as dormitories or prisons. In 2015, 28,110 people lived in group quarters in Alaska, representing 4 percent of the total population. Forty-six percent of Alaska's group quarters population resided in the Municipality of Anchorage or Fairbanks North Star Borough. The Aleutian chain, with its large fishing and seafood processing industries, had the highest percentage of the total population living in group quarters, at 49 percent. (See Table 2.7.)

Military

Alaska was home to 20,838 active duty military personnel in 2015, representing nearly 3 percent of the state's population. Of those, 56 percent were in the U.S. Army, followed by 35 percent in the Air Force and 9 percent in the Coast Guard. The state also had 29,252 military dependents. Boroughs with large active duty military and dependent populations included the Municipality of Anchorage, Fairbanks North Star Borough, and Kodiak Island Borough. (See Figure 3.1 and Table 3.1.)

Chapter 1

The State Population

Introduction

This chapter covers statewide population trends for Alaska. It contains information on the components of population change (births, deaths, and migration), as well as discussion of statewide age, sex, race and ethnicity, and household composition. Data provided for decennial census years have an April 1 reference date, and data for all others years have a July 1 reference date.

2015 Population and Density

Alaska had 737,625 residents on July 1, 2015, or 0.2 percent of the U.S. population. The 2015 resident population of the United States, excluding territories and military overseas, was 321,418,820.

Alaska was the third least populous state in 2015. The states with fewer people than Alaska were Wyoming with 586,107 and Vermont with 626,042. The District of Columbia also had

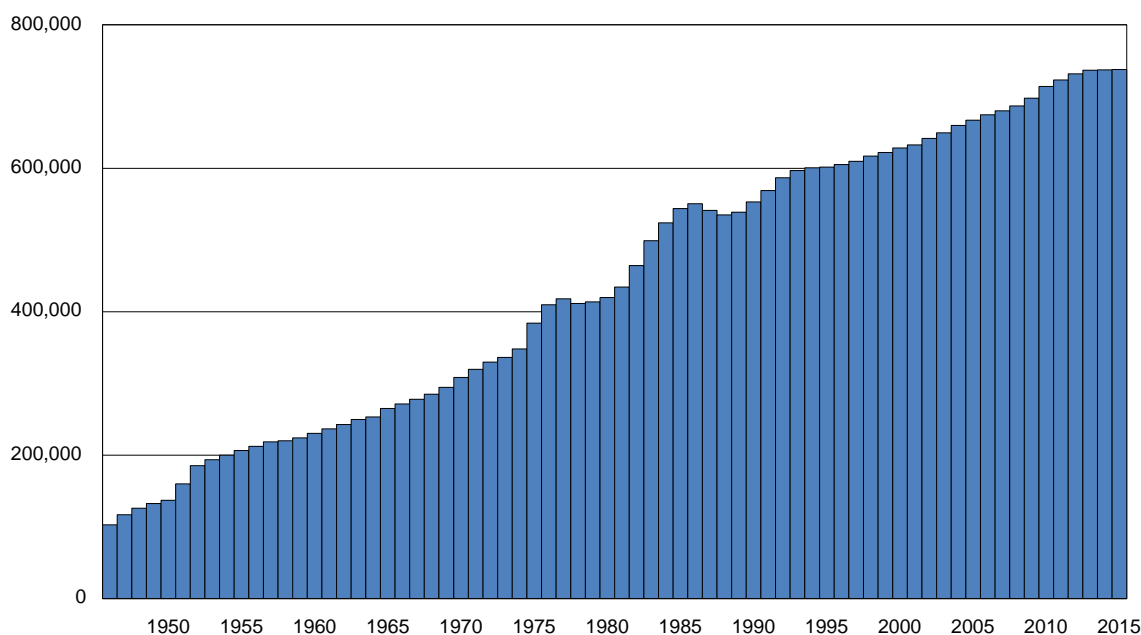
fewer people than Alaska, at 672,228.

Alaska has 570,641 square miles of land, or 16 percent of the U.S., and its water area is 94,743 square miles. Over 35 percent of total U.S. water area is in Alaska.

Alaska had 1.3 people per square mile in 2015, in contrast to 91 per square mile for the U.S. as a whole. Excluding Anchorage, which contains 41 percent of the state's population but only 0.3 percent of the land, Alaska averaged 0.8 people per square mile in 2015.

The majority of Alaskans live in towns and villages or clustered settlements. Most of the state's land area is owned by the federal government, the state government, or Alaska Native corporations. Excluding these areas, most of which place exclusions or restrictions on settlement, about 1 percent of the state's land is in other private ownership. Most of Alaska has settlements of moderate density surrounded by large tracts of uninhabited land.

Alaska Population History

The population of Alaska was quite small before the gold rush in the 1890s, although early territorial censuses were incomplete. The first census in 1880 counted 33,426 people. By 1900, the gold rush had nearly doubled the state's population to 63,592.

After the turn of the century, the population of Alaska remained roughly the same for 40 years. By 1939, it was 59,278. The state's gold production had declined, and much of the state remained inaccessible.

World War II brought the construction of the ALCAN (Alaska-Canadian) Highway, which resulted in dramatic growth for the state's population. The war and ALCAN construction played a key role in the development of Anchorage and Fairbanks.

Alaska's population grew rapidly from the end of World War II in 1945 through the Korean War years of 1950 through 1953. The state gained more than 25,000 people between 1951 and 1952 alone. After that, the population grew at a slower pace until the military buildups for the Vietnam War in the 1960s. At statehood in 1959, Alaska had approximately 224,000 people.

Construction of the 800-mile Trans-Alaska Oil Pipeline dramatically boosted population growth in the 1970s. The

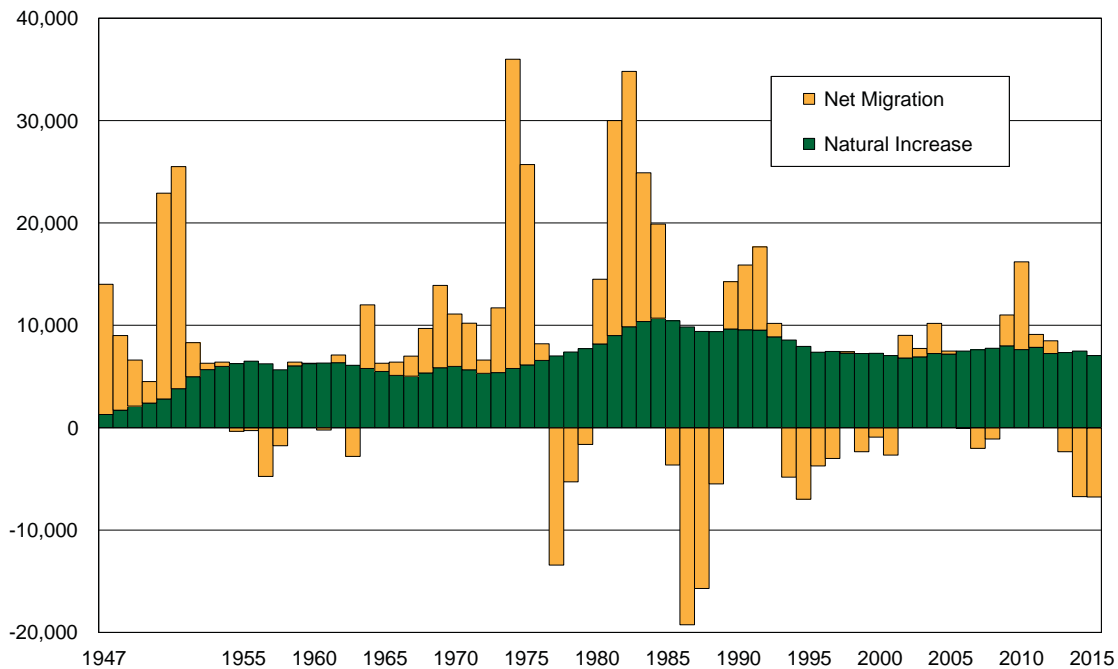
pipeline linked the giant North Slope oilfield of Prudhoe Bay with the oil terminal shipping facilities at Valdez. Pipeline construction began in 1973 and peaked between 1974 and 1975 with a migration gain of more than 30,000 people over that 12-month period. The boom from pipeline construction was followed by a large population loss after its completion. Between 1977 and 1978, the state had a net migration loss of more than 13,000 people.

With new revenue from oil production, Alaska had a massive economic boom between 1980 and 1985. The population increased nearly 30 percent in those five years, making Alaska the fastest-growing state. It grew most between 1982 and 1983, gaining nearly 25,000 people from net migration alone.

By 1986, falling oil prices triggered a recession. Between 1986 and 1987, the state lost more than 19,000 people through net migration for an overall population loss of 9,400. The cumulative net out-migration loss between 1986 and 1989 was about 40,000. The state had a high number of births during those years, but the population still dropped by more than 2 percent from its 1986 level. In 1989, net migration numbers became positive again.

Alaska's population increased more than 36 percent between 1970 and 1980 and nearly 32 percent between 1980 and 1990. For comparison, the U.S. as a whole grew by slightly more than 10 percent between 1970 and 1980 and another 10 percent between 1980 and 1990.

The 1990s began with three years of economic recovery and net migration gains that were followed by a period of net migration losses due in part to military base closures. Birth rates also declined in the 1990s due to the aging of “baby boomers” (people born between 1946 and 1964). The state’s population increased by less than 14 percent for the decade, slightly more than that of the nation as a whole.

Alaska then grew steadily between 2000 and 2010, and although high population turnover continued due to migration, the gains and losses were fairly balanced through 2009. Between 2009 and 2010, the state’s net migration gain topped 8,500 people, the most for a single year since the 1980s. This big gain was likely related to the late-2000s recession, which affected the nation far more severely than it did Alaska.

The state’s population grew steadily from 2010 to 2013, but remained roughly flat between 2013 and 2015 due to net migration losses.

Components of Change

Population change is made up of natural increase (births minus deaths) and migration, as shown in Table 1.1. Natural increase is a fairly stable component of population change because birth and death trends tend not to change quickly. Migration is a much less stable component of population

change in the state, often shifting dramatically from one year to the next.

Births and Deaths

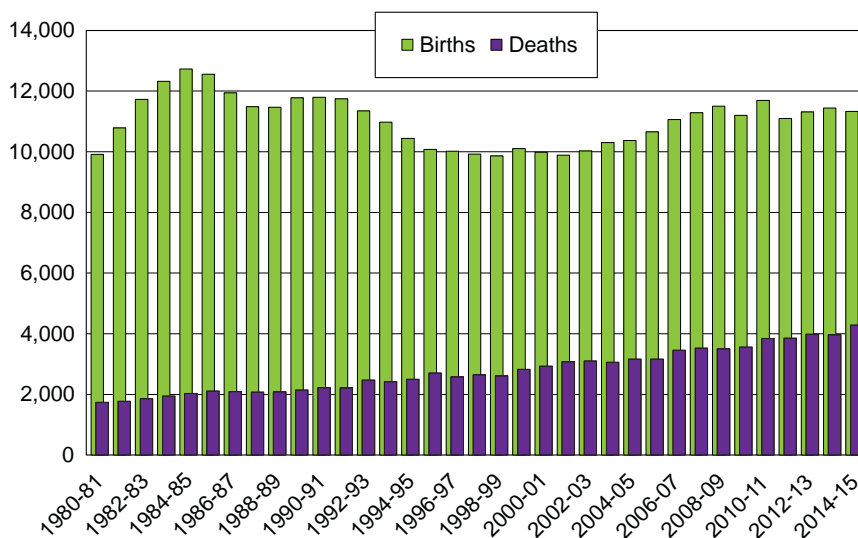
Births are a big part of population change for Alaska every year. In recent years, the state gained between 11,000 and 12,000 newborns annually.

Birth rates are best analyzed with a measure called the “total fertility rate,” which is the total number of children that would be born to a woman if she lived her entire life with that year’s “age-specific fertility rates,” or the number of births per woman by age. A total fertility rate of around 2.1 is needed for a population to replace itself through births alone.

Based on data from the National Center for Health Statistics, the total fertility rate for the U.S. was between 1.7 and 2.0 from the early 1970s to the late 1980s. In 1990, the national total fertility rate reached 2.1 children per woman and remained between 1.8 and 2.1 through 2015.

Alaska’s total fertility rate has consistently topped the national rate. Based on Alaska birth records and annual population estimates, Alaska’s rate from the early 1970s through the late 1980s was between 2.0 and 2.5. In 1990, Alaska’s total fertility rate reached more than 2.6, then fluctuated between 2.2 and 2.6 through 2010. Since 2010, it has remained between 2.0 and 2.4.

Table 1.1 shows trends in the crude birth rate (number of births divided by the total population) and crude death rate in Alaska. Newborns have accounted for less than 2 percent of the yearly population since the early 1990s, when the large population of baby boomers began to age past child-bearing years. The crude death rate reached a low of 0.38 percent of the population in the mid-1980s. As Alaska’s overall population has aged since then, the rate has increased. In 2015, 0.58 percent of the population died.

From 1980 to 1981, 5.7 Alaskans were born for every person who died during the same period. Ten years ago, from 2004 to 2005, the births-to-deaths ratio was 3.3. From 2014 to 2015, the ratio was 2.6. The declining direction of the ratio reflects Alaska’s aging population. (See Figure 1.3.)

Overall, Alaska added 36,951 people through natural increase between 2010 and 2015.

“Life expectancy at birth” for a given year is the number of years a person would live if that person lived an entire life with that year’s age-specific rates of mortality, which are the number of deaths per population by age.

According to the National Center for Health Statistics, the national life expectancy at birth increased steadily from 73.7 in 1980 to 78.7 in 2010. Based on Alaska death records and annual population estimates, Alaska’s statewide life expectancy increased from 72.1 in 1980 to 78.1 in 2010. The life expectancy at birth for Alaska Natives and American Indians increased from 65.7 in 1980 to 70.7 in 2010.

Migration

As shown in Figure 1.2 and Table 1.2, net migration can vary widely from year to year. Tens of thousands of people move both to and from the state each year, and relatively small fluctuations in the number moving in or out can yield a large net gain or loss.

In recent years, fluctuations in net migration for Alaska have often been attributed to economic trends and events, but troop movements are significant as well. Much of the migration to and from Alaska depends on the stationing of military personnel, which is tied to historical events and planning at the federal level.

The majority of people living in Alaska are migrants to the state — as of the 2010-2014 U.S. Census Bureau’s American Community Survey, 41 percent of Alaskans were born here. Regionally, these proportions varied from a low of 21 percent in the Aleutians West Census Area (home to a large fish processing industry) to a high of 97 percent in the Kusilvak Census Area. Generally, almost 60 percent of Alaskans residing in places other than the state’s five most populous boroughs were born in Alaska versus 36 percent in Anchorage, 33 percent in Fairbanks North Star Borough, and roughly 40 percent for the Matanuska-Susitna Borough, Kenai Peninsula Borough, and City and Borough of Juneau.

Based on 2010 to 2014 data from the American Community Survey, 7 percent of Alaskans were foreign-born. According to the 2000 Census, 6 percent of Alaskans were foreign-born. For the U.S., 13 percent were foreign-born in 2014, up from 11 percent in 2000.

At the state and national level, data to track annual migration are available from the Internal Revenue Service’s Tax Statistics, and these show that Alaska has among the highest rates of gross migration (in-migration plus out-migration) in the nation. Only the District of Columbia’s 18 percent gross migration rate was higher than Alaska’s 12 percent for 2013 to 2014 (the latest data available). The state with the next-highest rate was Wyoming at 11 percent.

The states that exchange the most people with Alaska

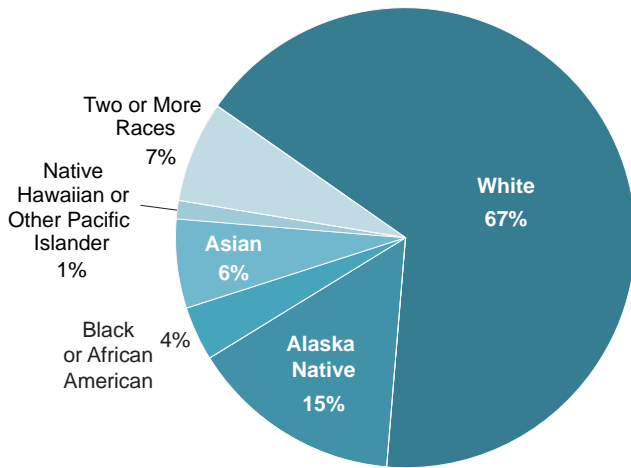

typically have large populations or are close geographically. From 2013 to 2014, Washington sent and received the highest number of movers to and from Alaska, followed by California and Texas.

Race and Ethnicity Categories

Race and ethnicity categories used by the U.S. Census Bureau have changed over the decades, and this affects the comparability of data from different years. Major race groupings in 2010 Census data are white, black or African American, American Indian or Alaska Native, Asian, and Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander. Individuals may write in their race under “some other race,” and those responses are then assigned one of the major race categories. Tables noted “modified race data” in this publication include the adjustment for some other race, and those without that note do not have the adjustment. There is also an ethnic categorization, which is separate from race, where people can report Hispanic origin.

Because the American Indian population in Alaska is quite small relative to the Alaska Native population, the term “Alaska Native” is used in this publication to refer to “American Indian or Alaska Native.” “Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander” is sometimes shortened to “Hawaiian or Pacific Islander” or just “Pacific Islander.”

The 2000 Census brought a fundamental change to race and ethnicity data collection by giving respondents the option to report more than one race. As a result, race data from

the 2000 and 2010 censuses are far more complex and not directly comparable to race data from previous censuses.

Because data for births, deaths, and many other events and groups are not yet collected on a multi-race basis, “bridged-race” race estimates, which assign all individuals to a single race group, are provided by the Alaska Department of Labor and Workforce Development as well as the National Center for Health Statistics.

Historical Alaska Native Population

Few reliable data are available on the overall size of the Alaska Native population before the 1929 territorial census. In 1929, 29,983 Alaska Natives made up 51 percent of Alaska’s population. Although the Alaska Native population has grown rapidly since 1929, the non-Native population has grown more rapidly. (See Table 1.3.)

Current Race and Ethnic Composition

The Alaska Native and American Indian (alone) population in Alaska was 110,157 in 2015, or 15 percent of the state’s total, a bigger proportion than any other state in the U.S. (For comparison, Hawaii’s population is 10 percent Native Hawaiian or other Pacific Islander (alone), and New Mexico and South Dakota are each 9 percent American Indian (alone), according to the U.S. Census Bureau’s 2010-2014 American Community Survey.)

Alaska’s white (alone) population was 491,143, or 67 percent of the state. (See Figure 1.4 and Table 1.4 for other groups.) Alaska had 50,850 Hispanic residents in 2015, which was 7 percent of the state total. People of Hispanic origin can be of any race.

Population by Age

The size of each age group is affected by aging along with births, deaths, and migration. Alaska’s age structure as of 2015 is shown in Table 1.11 and Figures 1.5, 1.6, and 1.7. Other than aging, the largest factor affecting Alaska’s age structure is migration, which is particularly high for 18-to-35-year-olds and their children younger than school age.

While Alaska’s total population increased 4 percent between the 2010 Census and July 2015, children under the age of 5 decreased from 53,996 to 53,054. This age group currently makes up 7 percent of the state’s population. From its high in 1993, the number of young children steadily declined to a low of 47,270 in 2001 but rose steadily over the next nine years. The number of children in this age group is volatile because migration has a large effect on it.

The population aged 5 to 13 are of elementary and middle school age. This group grew by 4 percent between 2010 and

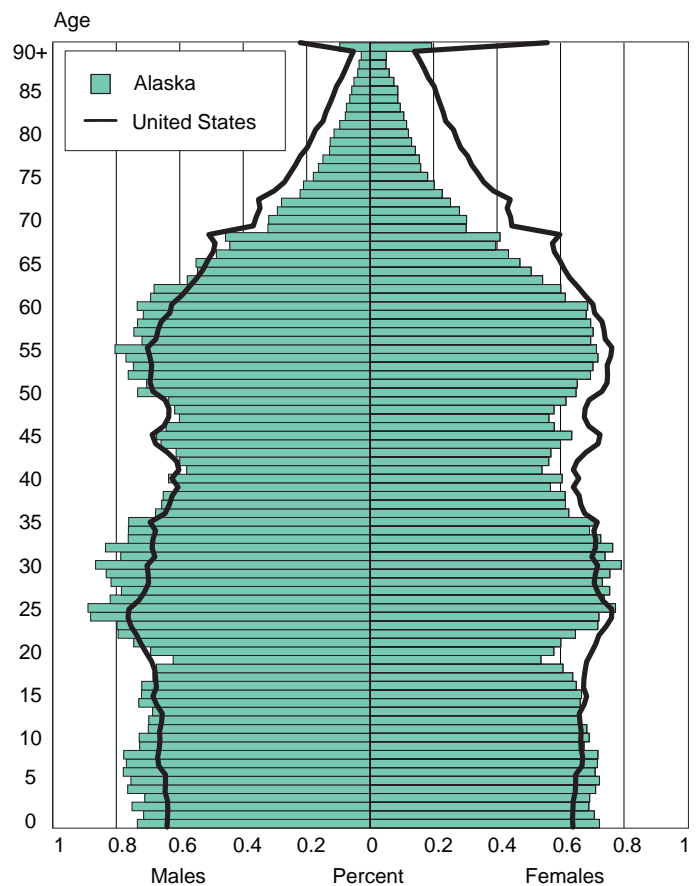
2015, from 91,587 to 94,804, and made up 13 percent of the state population in 2015.

The number of youths aged 14 to 17 has declined 3 percent since 2010, from 41,795 to 40,340 in 2015. Teens in this age group made up 5 percent of the state in 2015. In general, teenagers are less subject to changes in migration flows than younger age groups.

The 18-to-24 age group — which has very high rates of migration for school and work — has decreased 5 percent since 2010, from 74,881 to 70,928 in 2015. People in this age group made up 10 percent of the state’s population that year. In general, migration yields a net loss of people at ages 18 and 19, followed by a net gain for ages 20 to 24.

The population aged 25 to 34 is composed of young adults in prime ages for forming families and households. People in this age group contribute heavily to the number of children

under age 5. In 2015, 16 percent (115,194) of Alaska residents were 25 to 34 years old. In 2010, 15 percent (103,125) of Alaska residents were in this age group. Alaska typically has strong net migration gains of people aged 25 to 34.

The size of Alaska’s population aged 35 to 44 decreased slightly between 2010 and 2015. The group was 12 percent (91,829) of the state total in 2015, down from 13 percent (92,974) in 2010.

The 45-to-54 age group still includes some baby boomers (born between 1946 and 1964). This segment of the population decreased from 16 percent (111,026) of the state in 2010 to 13 percent in 2015. As of 2015, an estimated 97,910 Alaskans were in this age group.

Despite the typical net migration losses of people aged 55 to 64, this group has grown sharply over the past five years as baby boomers aged. The state had 98,713 in this group (13 percent of the state total) in 2015, up from 85,909 (12 percent) in 2010.

Alaskans aged 65 and older numbered 74,853 in 2015, and the size of Alaska’s population aged 55 to 64 suggests the number of seniors will increase dramatically over the next decade. The 65-plus group increased from 8 percent of the state total in 2010 to 10 percent in 2015.

The growth rate between 2010 and 2015 for seniors in Alaska was higher than any other state — but as of 2015, Alaska’s percentage of senior citizens remained the smallest of any state. (In the U.S. as a whole, 15 percent were 65 or older in 2015.)

Median Age

Alaska’s population is younger than the national average but the gap is narrowing, largely due to the aging of Alaska’s large baby boomer population. (See Figure 1.5.) The U.S. median age in 2015 was 37.8, and the median age for Alaska was 34.5. Alaska had the fourth-youngest population in the U.S. after Utah (30.7), the District of Columbia (33.8), and Texas (34.3). In 2010, the U.S. median age was 37.2, and Alaska’s was 33.8.

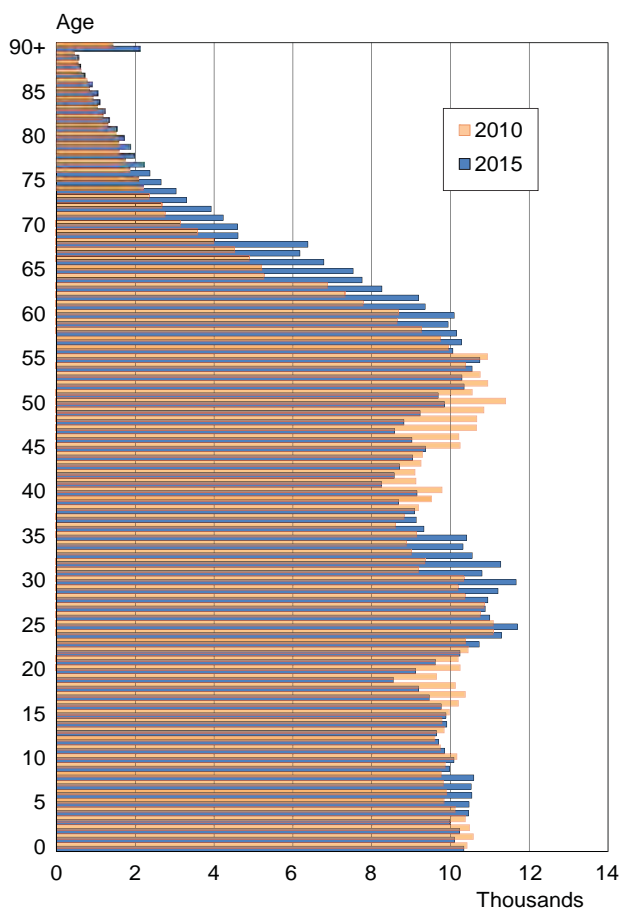
By race, the median ages of Alaskans in 2015 were: 38.0 for white alone, 29.1 for Alaska Native alone, 30.3 for African American alone, 35.6 for Asian alone, 26.1 for Hawaiian and Pacific Islander alone, and 18.5 for people of two or more races. The median age for people of Hispanic origin was 25.9.

The Alaska Native population is generally younger because of higher birth rates and a smaller baby boomer population. The Hawaiian and Pacific Islander and Hispanic populations are younger due to a combination of higher birth rates and the age and year of migration for the share that moved to Alaska. The African American population is relatively young because a larger share is military. The very low median age for those who are of two or more races is the result of an increasing proportion of multiracial children, and perhaps a greater tendency of younger multiracial Alaskans to identify as such.

Voting Age Population

As of July 1, 2015, the voting age population (those 18 and

over) in Alaska totaled 549,427. Of that population, the white alone group was 386,152 (70 percent), Alaska Native alone was 74,454 (14 percent), Asian alone made up 34,882 (6 percent), African Americans were 21,058 (4 percent), Hawaiians or Pacific Islanders were 6,085 (1 percent), and people of two or more races totaled 26,796 (5 percent). An estimated 33,263 (6 percent) voting-aged Alaskans were of Hispanic origin.

Dependency

Dependency ratios are ratios of the working-age population (ages 18 to 64) to the young and old largely nonworking populations. In 2015, for every 100 Alaskans aged 18 to 64, there were 40 Alaskans under 18 (unchanged from 2010) and 16 Alaskans over 65 (up from 12 in 2010). For comparison, the U.S. had 37 children and 24 seniors for every 100 people of working age in 2015.

Male-to-Female Ratio

Alaska had 107.5 males for every 100 females in 2015 — much higher than the national ratio of 97 to 100, but down from 2010's ratio of 108.5 to 100.

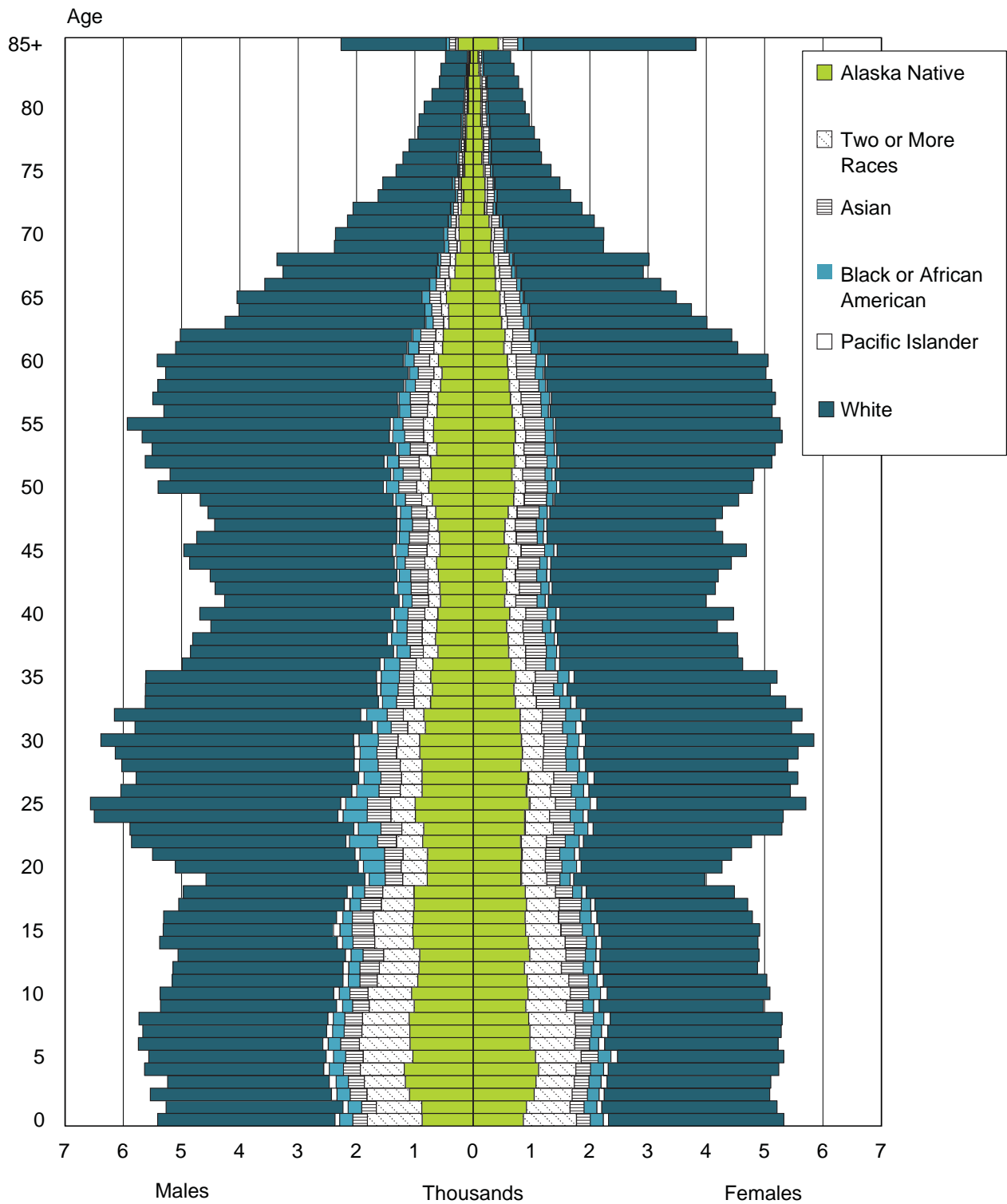
By race, the male-to-female ratio was 111 for white alone, 101 for Alaska Native alone, 129 for African American alone, 87 for Asian alone, and 99 for Hawaiian or Pacific Islander alone. The particularly high male-to-female ratio for African Americans reflects the larger share of Alaska's African American population in the military. The low male-to-female ratio for Asian Alaskans reflects a nationwide phenomenon (91 males for every 100 females) and is at least partly attributable to U.S. immigration policy that favors family reunification. Alaska's male-to-female ratio for people of Hispanic origin was 109 in 2015.

States with younger populations tend to have higher male-to-female ratios, in part because the ratio at birth is typically around 105 and also because life expectancy is generally lower for males, so the ratio decreases at higher ages. Employment can also affect male-to-female ratios for certain areas, such as the military, fishing, and mining in Alaska. Other states that had high ratios as of the Census Bureau's 2015 population estimates were North Dakota (106), Wyoming (104), and Hawaii (103).

While Alaska had very large male-to-female ratios at some points in its history (including the gold rush era and during large military buildups) and continues to have the highest ratio in the nation, the difference is sometimes exaggerated. Some communities in Alaska tend to be heavily male due to local industries, but most have ratios close to the U.S. average.

As shown in Figure 1.8, the highest ratio of males to females was for the 20-to-24-year-old group, at 120. Ages 65-69 were second with a ratio of 112. The relatively high male-to-

female ratio at higher ages in Alaska is because more young adult males moved to the state in the 1970s and 1980s than females.

In 2010, 26,352 people (4 percent of the state) lived in group quarters. In 2015, 28,110 people (4 percent) lived in group quarters.

Alaska Households and Living Arrangements

The Census Bureau counts all people as living either in a household or a “group quarters” facility (a shared living facility such as a dormitory or prison). Any occupied housing unit is a household. The Census Bureau defines a housing unit as a house, an apartment, a mobile home, a group of rooms, or a single room that is occupied (or if vacant, is intended for occupancy) as separate living quarters.

The number of households in Alaska increased by 6,126, or 2 percent, from 2010 to 2015. The number of people per household increased slightly, from 2.65 to 2.69. Among Alaska households, 36 percent, or 93,793, had one or more people under 18 in 2015, and 54,433, or 21 percent, had one or more people 65 or older. (See Table 1.5.)

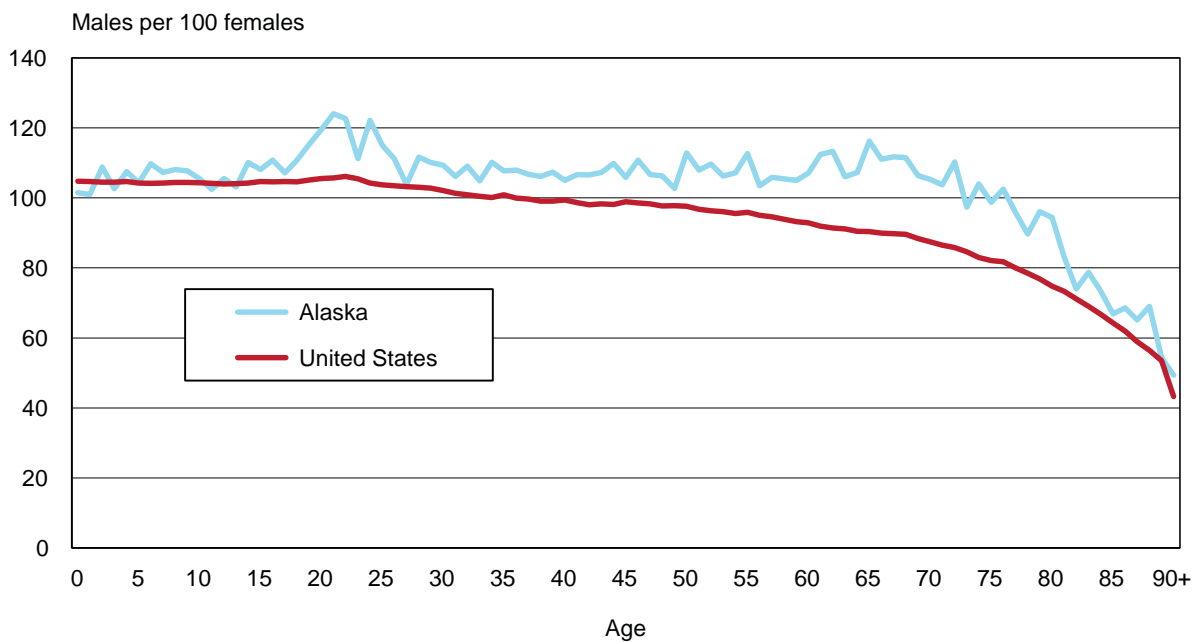
All people not living in households live in group quarters, which are in two categories: 1) institutionalized (such as prisons, nursing homes, psychiatric hospitals, and residential treatment facilities) and 2) others in group quarters (such as group homes, college dorms, military barracks, fish processing and logging camp bunkhouses, and emergency shelters).

Chapter 2

Alaska Boroughs and Census Areas

Introduction

This chapter presents detailed estimates of population by age, race, and sex for Alaska’s boroughs and census areas. It also provides comprehensive analysis of geographic variation for population trends, households, components of change, and population composition.

Boroughs and Census Areas

As of July 1, 2015, the state had 19 organized boroughs, which are equivalent to counties in the rest of the United States. The three types of boroughs vary by the services they provide and their relationships with city governments.

The Municipality of Anchorage, the City and Borough of Juneau, the City and Borough of Sitka, and the City and Borough of Wrangell are unified home rule municipalities, where the city government and borough government are merged.

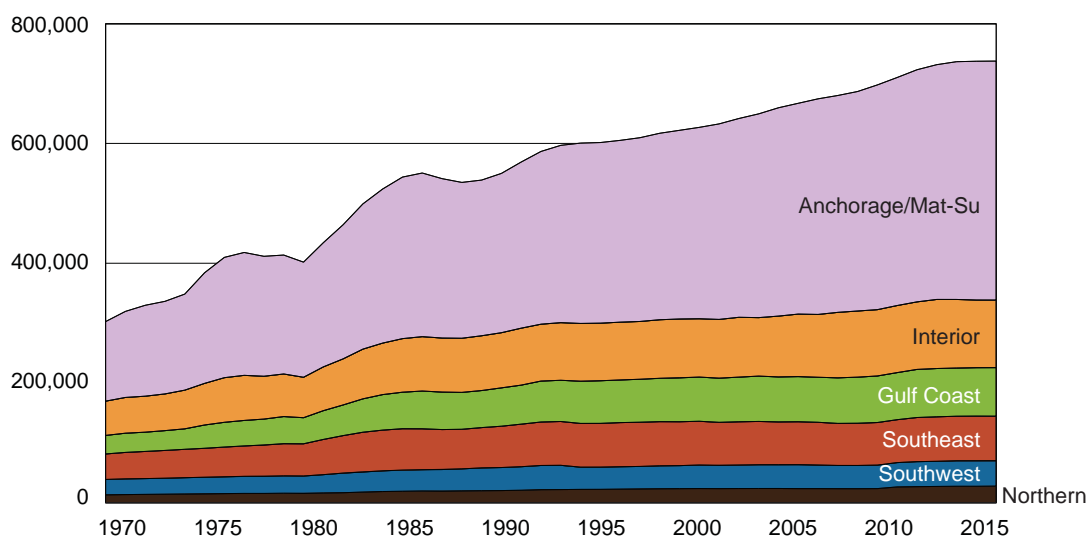
The other two types are distinguished by the level of services they are mandated to provide. These remaining 15 boroughs

are not unified, and although most contain organized cities within the borough boundaries, some do not. Bristol Bay Borough, Haines Borough, the Municipality of Skagway, and the City and Borough of Yakutat contain no incorporated cities.

The U.S. Census Bureau divides the remaining unorganized territory, which accounts for about 56 percent of the state’s land area, into 10 census areas for statistical purposes. Although these are only statistical units, the federal government considers them county equivalents. Many of the boundaries of the census areas tend to follow Alaska Native Regional Corporation (ANRC) and Regional Educational Attendance Area (REAA) boundaries. All of the census areas contain incorporated cities.

Due to new borough formations and boundary changes over the years, it is not always possible to make direct historical comparisons for the boroughs and census areas. Maps of the boroughs and census areas at the time of each census are available upon request and are also on the Alaska Department of Labor and Workforce Development’s Research and Analysis Web site (laborstats.alaska.gov).

There were a few major boundary changes in the late 2000s and early 2010s. In 2007, the Municipality of Skagway was formed out of part of the Skagway-Hoonah-Angoon Census Area. The remaining area is now the Hoonah-Angoon Census Area.

The City and Borough of Wrangell was formed in 2008 out of the Wrangell-Petersburg Census Area and part of the former Prince of Wales-Outer Ketchikan Census Area. The remainder of the former Wrangell-Petersburg Census Area was renamed Petersburg Census Area.

The Ketchikan Gateway Borough annexed what remained of the Outer Ketchikan Census Subarea in 2008, except Hyder. The Prince of Wales-Outer Ketchikan Census Area was re-named Prince of Wales-Hyder Census Area.

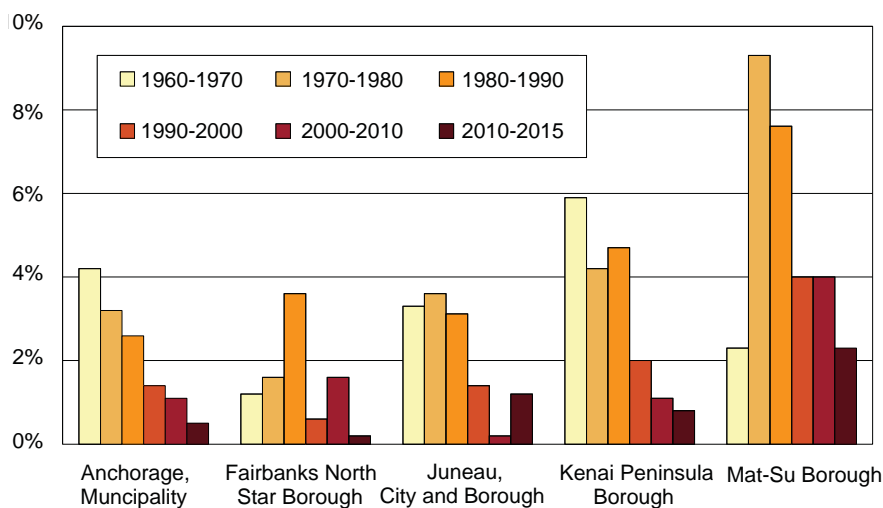
Petersburg Borough incorporated in January 2013, replacing the former Petersburg Census Area and further changing the boundaries of Hoonah-Angoon Census Area and Prince of Wales-Hyder Census Area.

All numbers presented here are based on the Census Bureau's 2015 geographic boundaries. Kusilvak Census Area is the new official name of the former Wade Hampton Census Area. This name changed in July 2015, but the boundaries remained the same.

Population Trends

Alaska's growth was strong but varied over recent decades.

Most growth was in the state's urban areas, as shown in Figure 2.1, which illustrates how the Anchorage/Matanuska-Susitna Region's population has become increasingly dominant.

In 2015, 80 percent of Alaska's population was in the following five boroughs: Municipality of Anchorage (41 percent), Matanuska-Susitna Borough (14 percent), Fairbanks North Star Borough (13 percent), Kenai Peninsula Borough (8 percent), and City and Borough of Juneau (5 percent). Figure 2.2 compares the growth rates of these boroughs by decade back to 1960.

Population growth in Alaska has been uneven over the last 30 years. Between 1980 and 1985, the state grew at an average annual rate of 6 percent. During the economic bust between 1985 and 1990, the state only grew an average of 0.2 percent annually. For the 1990 to 1995 period, Alaska grew by an average of almost 2 percent a year. Between 1995 and 2000, the rate slowed to just under 1 percent. From 2000 to 2005, the rate was steady at 1.2 percent per year on average, which picked up toward the end of the decade to reach an average of 1.3 percent annually between 2005 and 2010.

The state's population grew by 0.7 percent on average each year from 2010 to 2015, with the majority of growth in the Anchorage/Matanuska-Susitna Region. The Matanuska-Susitna Borough's growth rate was the fastest at an average of 2.3 percent annually during the past five years, more than three times the statewide average. Population growth was also strong in Kusilvak Census Area (1.8 percent), Municipality of Skagway (1.4 percent), and Bethel Census Area (1.2 percent).

In contrast, eight of Alaska's boroughs or census areas lost population on an average annual basis between 2010 and 2015. The boroughs with population losses were the Bristol Bay Borough (-2.2 percent), Aleutians East Borough (-1.8 percent), City and Borough of Yakutat (-1.5 percent), Denali Borough (-0.5 percent), Southeast Fairbanks Census Area (-0.4 percent), Yukon-Koyukuk Census Area (-0.3 percent), Valdez-Cordova Census Area (-0.2 percent), and Haines Borough (-0.1 percent). The population of Petersburg Borough remained about the same. (See Table 2.1.)

Population Density

Overall, Alaska's land area is 16 percent of the entire United States. In 2015, Alaska averaged 1.3 people per square mile, in contrast to 91 people per square mile nationally. These numbers can be misleading, however, because high rates of federal, state, and Native land ownership — in addition to limited accessibility — preclude

settlement on much of Alaska's land mass.

The Municipality of Anchorage's population density was by far the highest in Alaska in 2015, at roughly 175 people per square mile. Anchorage was followed by the Fairbanks North Star Borough at 13 and the City and Borough of Juneau with 12. The lowest population density was in the Interior Region, with the Yukon-Koyukuk Census Area having 0.04 people per square mile. Fifteen boroughs and census areas had population densities of less than one person per square mile.

Some borough and census area populations live within a small part of their total geographic area, so population densities in settled areas may be considerably higher than that of official boundaries. For example, most of the population of the Matanuska-Susitna Borough is concentrated in the area between the Matanuska and Little Susitna rivers. Population density in that area is much greater than that of the entire borough, which averages four people per square mile.

Group Quarters

As Chapter 1 describes, the Census Bureau recognizes two categories of group quarters facilities: institutional (such as prisons, nursing homes, or military barracks) and noninstitutional (such as rooming houses, group homes, college dorms,

emergency shelters, or logging and fish processing bunk-houses).

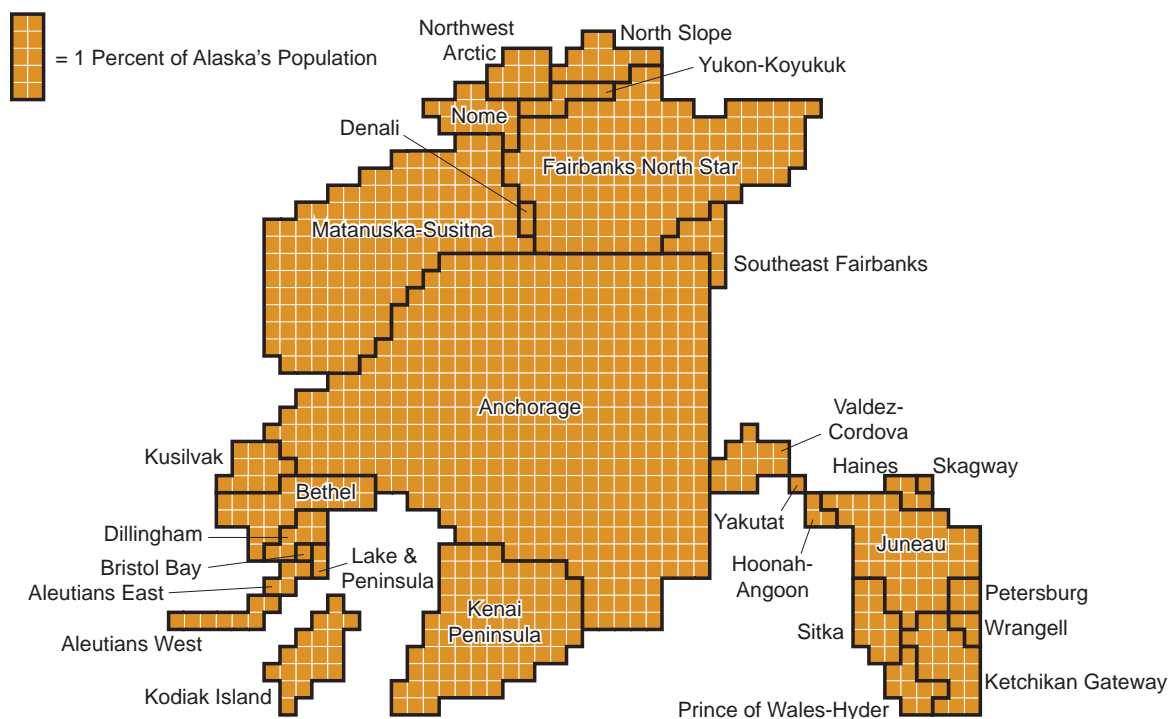
In 2015, an estimated 28,110 people — or 3.8 percent of Alaska — lived in group quarters, up slightly from 26,352 people (3.7 percent) in 2010. Tables 2.2 to 2.7 provide housing and group quarters data for all boroughs and census areas.

In 2015, 46 percent of Alaska's group quarters population lived in the Municipality of Anchorage and Fairbanks North Star Borough. Military barracks, University of Alaska dormitories, State of Alaska correctional facilities, a combination of profit and nonprofit group homes and nursing homes, and homeless shelters made up the population of group quarters in more populated areas.

The Aleutians East Borough and Aleutians West Census Area continue to have very large group quarters populations connected with fishing and the seafood processing industry, with nearly 50 percent of their combined total population in group quarters in 2015. The Aleutians East Borough had the greatest proportion at 54 percent, followed by the Aleutians West Census Area (46 percent).

The North Slope Borough had an estimated 2,669 people (27 percent of its total population) in group quarters in 2015. This was primarily due to 2010 Census counts of employees at

remote work sites in the borough who were not counted at the sites in previous censuses.

Other areas in the state with relatively high shares in group quarters were Southeast Fairbanks Census Area (5.4 percent), Fairbanks North Star Borough (4.9 percent), and Northwest Arctic Borough (4.8 percent). Group quarters in Southeast Fairbanks Census Area and Fairbanks North Star Borough are largely military. Fairbanks North Star Borough is also home to a large number of college students in dormitories. Mining accounts for the group quarters population in Northwest Arctic Borough.

Housing Units and Households

A household includes all people who occupy a housing unit, which can be a house, an apartment, a mobile home, a group of rooms, or a single room that is occupied as separate living quarters. Tables 2.2 through 2.7 provide housing and household data for Alaska boroughs and census areas.

The number of households (occupied housing units) in Alaska in 2015 was estimated at 264,184, an increase of 6,126, or 2 percent, since 2010. The state's number of people per household edged up from 2.65 to 2.69.

Areas with larger household sizes are in the northern and western areas of the state. In 2015, these included Kusilvak Census Area with an average of 4.18 people per household,

followed by Northwest Arctic Borough (3.77), Bethel Census Area (3.52), North Slope Borough (3.44), and Nome Census Area (3.28).

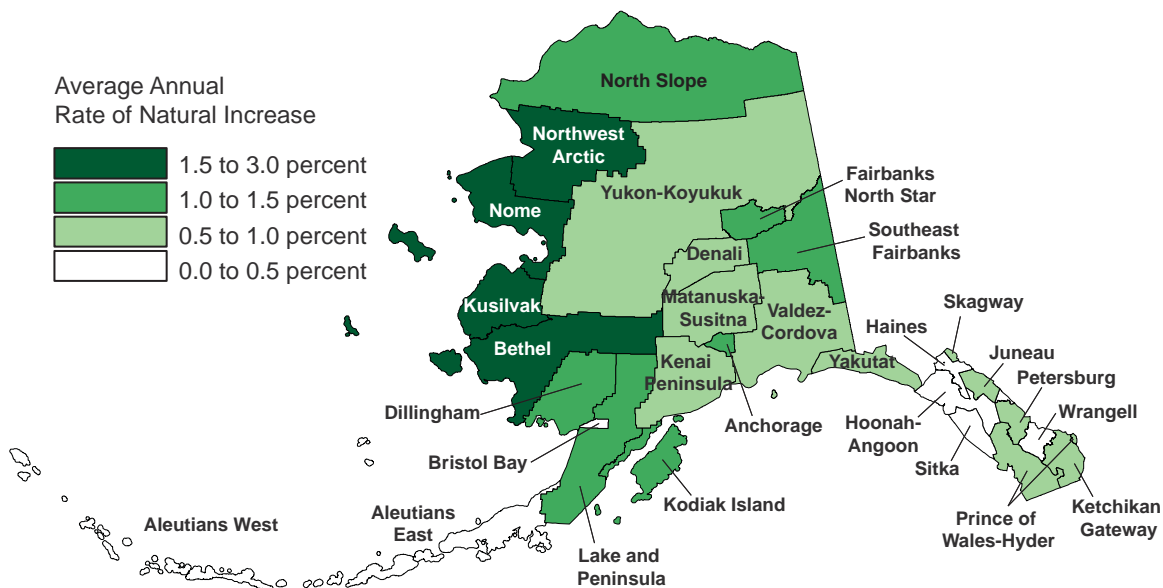
The smallest households were in Bristol Bay Borough and Denali Borough (both with 2.04 people on average), Haines Borough (2.08), Municipality of Skagway (2.09), and the City and Borough of Wrangell (2.17). Southeast Alaska is well-represented on the list of small household sizes, as its population is older so fewer households include children.

Components of Population Change

Population change has two parts: natural increase, which is births minus deaths, and net migration, which is in-migration minus out-migration. These components of change are presented in Table 2.8, which also includes birth and death rates for each area. (Also see Figures 2.4 and 2.5.)

The major population centers had the largest total population increases between April 2010 and July 2015. Matanuska-Susitna Borough gained the largest number of people during that period at 11,183, followed by the Municipality of Anchorage (+7,082), Kenai Peninsula Borough (+2,363), and City and Borough of Juneau (+2,002). The areas that lost the most net population between 2010 and 2015 included Aleutians East Borough (-287), Southeast Fairbanks Census Area (-127), Valdez-Cordova Census Area (-110), and Bristol Bay Borough (-110).

Births and Deaths

The April 2010 to July 2015 average annual birth rate for Alaska was 1.6 births per 100 people, equal to the average annual birth rate for 2000 to 2010 and above the national rate of 1.3 from 2010 to 2015.

The highest birth rates were in areas with higher-than-average numbers of Alaska Natives. The Kusilvak Census Area had the highest average annual rate between 2010 to 2015 with 3.0 births per 100 people. Other areas with high rates included Bethel Census Area (2.5), Northwest Arctic Borough (2.4), and Nome Census Area (2.4).

Birth rates were lowest in the Aleutians and Southeast Alaska. Aleutians East Borough and Aleutians West Census Area, where nearly two-thirds of the population are male, had average annual rates of 0.5 and 0.6 per 100, respectively. The lower-than-average birth rates in Southeast Alaska are related to the relatively old age of the population there. Haines Borough had an average annual birth rate of 0.8 per 100 people for 2010 to 2015.

Alaska's average annual death rate was 0.5 per 100 people between April 2010 to July 2015, the same as between 2000 and 2010. The death rate is closely related to age and is expected to increase over time as Alaska's median age increases.

The boroughs/census areas with the lowest average annual death rates in the state between 2010 to 2015 were the Aleutians East Borough and the Aleutians West Census Area,

both at 0.2 deaths per 100 people. The state's highest death rates were in the Yukon-Koyukuk Census Area (1.0), the City and Borough of Wrangell (0.9), Bristol Bay Borough (0.8), and Haines Borough (0.8).

Migration

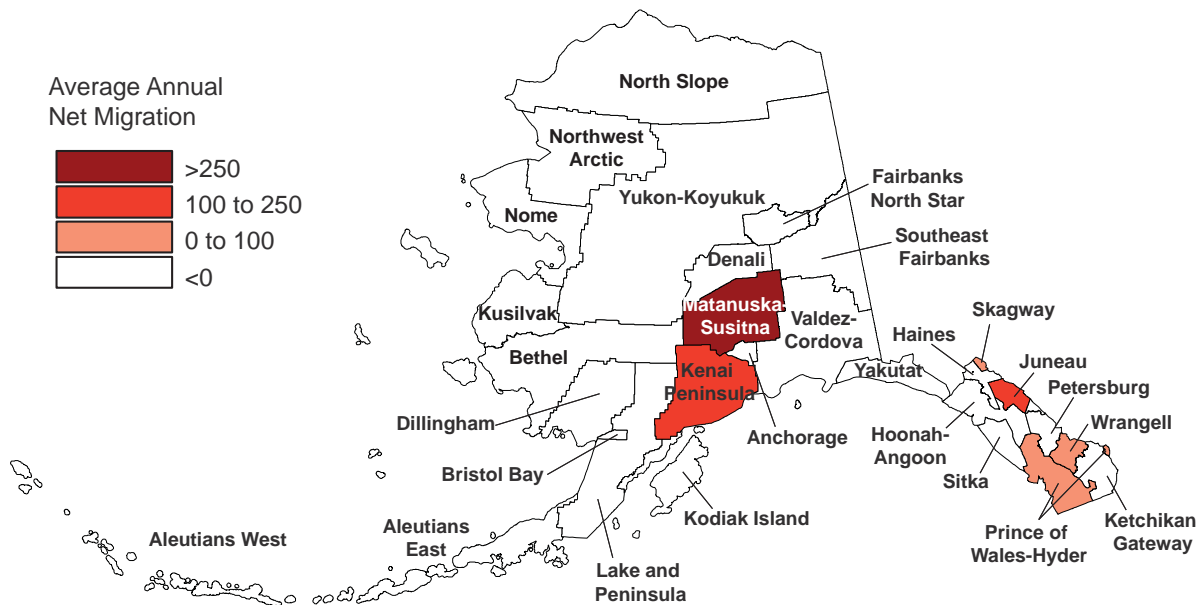
Migration is made up of in-migration and out-migration flows. Net migration is in-migration minus out-migration for a given place. The total volume of population turnover due to migration (in-migration and out-migration) is called gross migration.

Although Alaska hasn't had dramatic net migration gains in the past couple of decades, it has one of the nation's highest rates of population turnover from migration. There are large migration flows within the state as well, particularly to and from the state's major population centers. Between 2014 and 2015, five of Alaska's six economic regions had net migration losses to the sixth region, Anchorage/Mat-Su.

The highest average annual rate of net migration (or rate of change in population size due to migration) between 2010 to 2015 was in the Matanuska-Susitna Borough at 1.4 percent. The Municipality of Skagway had the next-highest rate at 0.7 percent.

The boroughs and census areas with the highest rates of loss due to net migration between 2010 to 2015 include the Bristol Bay Borough at 2.6 percent of the total population per year

and the City and Borough of Yakutat at 2.3 percent.

Some areas have high rates of population loss due to net migration but maintain their size through natural increase. An example is Fairbanks North Star Borough, which had an average rate of net migration loss of 1.1 percent per year between 2010 and 2015, yet the total population grew by 1 percent during the same period.

Proportion Alaska Native

Boroughs and census areas in the Southwest, Northern, and Interior regions have the highest proportions of Alaska Natives. (See Figure 2.6.)

As described in Chapter 1, respondents were able to select more than one race on the 2000 and 2010 Census forms, so there are at least three measures of population by race: race alone, race alone or in combination with other races, and “bridged-race.” Bridged-race data, which are available upon request, provide estimates for population by race in which all respondents are assigned a single race. Also, tables noted “modified race data” in this publication include the adjustment for “some other race” (described in Chapter 1).

The Municipality of Anchorage had the largest number of Alaska Natives alone (24,906) in 2015. The share of Anchorage’s total population that was Alaska Native was relatively low, though, at just 8 percent. (See Tables 2.9 through 2.14.)

The area with the second-largest Alaska Native alone population in 2015 was Bethel Census Area (14,821). Eighty-two percent of the area’s population is Alaska Native alone.

The five boroughs/census areas with the highest numerical increases in residents reporting their race as Alaska Native alone between 2010 and 2015 were the Matanuska-Susitna Borough (+1,567), Municipality of Anchorage (+1,031), Bethel Census Area (+696), Kusilvak Census Area (+416), and Nome Census Area (+259).

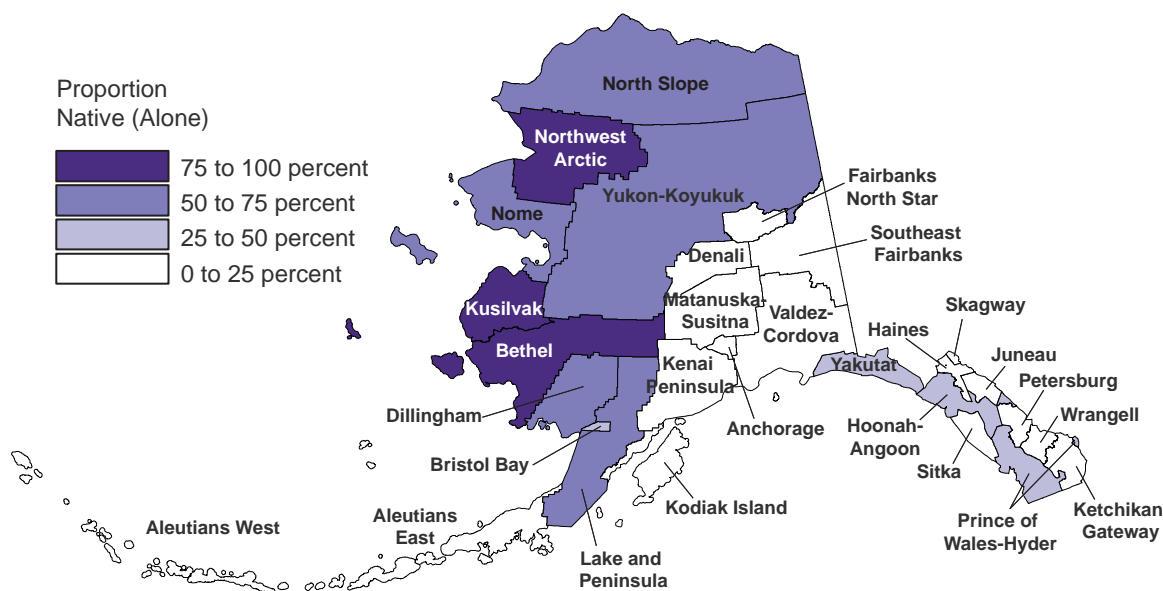
In 2015, 45 percent (49,549) of Alaska Natives (alone) lived in areas that were more than half Native.

Due to migration from rural to urban areas, the proportion of the Alaska Native (alone) population living in boroughs that were 10 percent or less Alaska Native alone grew to 39 percent in 2015, up from 38 percent in 2010.

Boroughs/census areas that were 10 percent or less Alaska Native alone in 2015 included Petersburg Borough (10 percent), Municipality of Anchorage (8 percent), Kenai Peninsula Borough (7 percent), Fairbanks North Star Borough (7 percent), Matanuska-Susitna Borough (7 percent), Municipality of Skagway (5 percent), and Denali Borough (5 percent).

Male-to-Female Ratio

The male-to-female ratio is the number of males per 100 females. In 2015, there were 107 males for every 100 females statewide. The boroughs and census areas with the highest male-to-female ratios were Aleutians West Census Area (199 males per 100 females), Aleutians East Borough (195), North Slope Borough (162), Denali Borough (125), the City and Borough of Yakutat (124), and Southeast Fairbanks Census Area (124). Many of these areas have large fishing and seafood processing industries or military, oil and gas, and mining, which all have proportionately more men.

The boroughs and census areas with the lowest average male/female ratios were the City and Borough of Sitka (100), Municipality of Skagway (100), Haines Borough (101), Municipality of Anchorage (102), City and Borough of Juneau (103), and the City and Borough of Wrangell (103). In general, urban areas and areas with older populations tend to have lower male-to-female ratios.

Median Age

Alaska's median age was estimated at 34.5 as of July 1, 2015, an increase from 33.8 in 2010. As discussed in Chapter 1, Alaska's population is aging roughly in line with the trend throughout the United States. The U.S. median age was 37.8 in 2015, up from 37.2 in 2010.

The Alaska areas with the oldest median age as of 2015 were

Haines Borough (49.3), City and Borough of Wrangell (47.8), Hoonah-Angoon Census Area (47.3), Aleutians East Borough (44.1), Bristol Bay Borough (44.1), and City and Borough of Yakutat (43.2).

The youngest median ages in 2015 were in the Northern and Southwest regions of the state. These areas included Kusilvak Census Area (23.5 years), Bethel Census Area (26.9), Northwest Arctic Borough (27.4), Nome Census Area (28.0), and Dillingham Census Area (29.5).

The largest increases in median age between 2010 and 2015 were in the City and Borough of Yakutat (+3.5 years) and Haines Borough (+2.4). The largest decreases were in the North Slope Borough (-1.5 years) and Valdez-Cordova Census Area (-0.6).

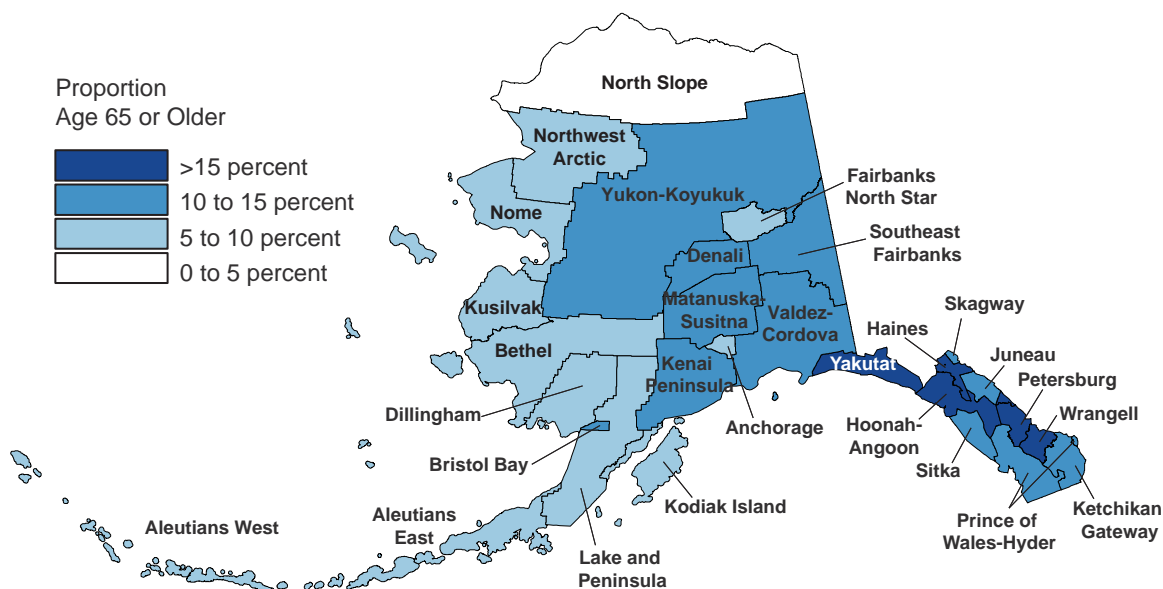
Seniors

The proportion of the state population aged 65 and older was 10 percent in 2015. The older population steadily increased from 3 percent in 1980 to 4 percent in 1990, then up to 6 percent in 2000 and 8 percent in 2010. Although Alaska still has the smallest percentage of people aged 65 and older among states, it is following the nationwide aging trend.

Some parts of Alaska had a higher concentration of older Alaskans than others. Southeast was highest. The City and Borough of Wrangell and Haines Borough led with 19 percent each,

followed by Hoonah-Angoon Census Area with 18 percent and Petersburg Borough with 16 percent. (See Figure 2.7.)

Other Southeast areas with a higher-than-average percentage were City and Borough of Yakutat (15 percent), City and Borough of Sitka (14 percent), Ketchikan Gateway Borough (14 percent), Municipality of Skagway (13 percent), Prince of Wales-Hyder Census Area (13 percent), and City and Borough of Juneau (11 percent).

Areas outside Southeast with relatively large shares of seniors were Kenai Peninsula Borough (15 percent), Yukon-Koyukuk Census Area (12 percent), and Southeast Fairbanks Census Area (12 percent).

North Slope Borough, with its large group quarters population, had one of the lowest shares of seniors in 2015, at just 5 percent. Other areas with relatively few older Alaskans included Kusilvak Census Area (6 percent), Aleutians West Census Area (7 percent), Nome Census Area (7 percent), Northwest Arctic Borough (7 percent), Bethel Census Area (7 percent), and Aleutians East Borough (7 percent).

In 2015, 80 percent of Alaska seniors lived in the following areas: Municipality of Anchorage (38 percent), Matanuska-Susitna Borough (14 percent), Fairbanks North Star Borough (12 percent), Kenai Peninsula Borough (11 percent), and City and Borough of Juneau (5 percent). Many senior citizens choose or need to live in urban areas, where medical care and other necessities are more accessible.

Chapter 3

Special Populations and Areas

Introduction

This chapter includes frequently requested estimates of the populations of the military, legislative districts, school districts, Alaska Native Regional Corporations, Alaska Native Village Statistical Areas, and adjacent areas of Canada.

Armed Forces

In 2015, Alaska had 20,838 active duty military personnel with 29,252 dependents. (See Table 3.1.) The Army, Air Force, and Coast Guard make up nearly all of the military population. With the closure of Adak's naval air station in 1997, the Navy no longer maintains a significant presence here.

As of 2015, most of the military population was Army, at 56 percent. (See Figure 3.1.) Alaska's Army bases are in Anchorage (Joint Base Elmendorf-Richardson), Fairbanks (Fort Wainwright), and Delta Junction (Fort Greely).

The Air Force represented 35 percent. Alaska's Air Force bases are located in Anchorage (Joint Base Elmendorf-Richardson), Fairbanks (Eielson Air Force Base), and Denali Borough (Clear Air Force Station).

The Coast Guard made up 9 percent of active duty military in 2015. Alaska's Coast Guard locations include Anchorage, Cordova, Juneau, Kodiak, Sitka, Petersburg, and Valdez.

Boroughs and census areas with bases can have a high percentage of population in the military. For example, active duty military and dependents in Fairbanks North Star Borough were 19 percent of the area's population in 2015 and 17 percent of Kodiak Island Borough's population.

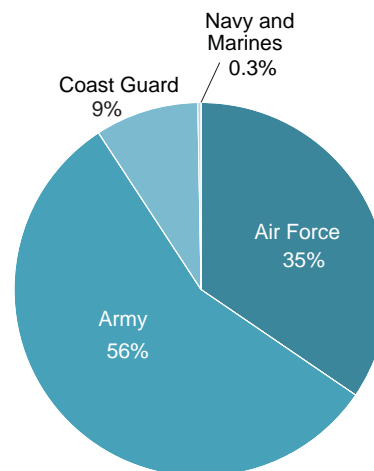
Legislative Districts

The Alaska Redistricting Board established the current House and Senate districts for the Alaska Legislature in 2013. Overall, the state has 40 House districts and 20 Senate districts. Table 3.2 provides district population data. In 2015, the average population of the House district areas was 18,441 and the average for the Senate areas was 36,881.

School Districts

Table 3.3 shows the population within Alaska school district boundaries for 2010 through 2015. Of the 53 school districts

in 2015, the Anchorage School District had the largest population within its boundaries, with 298,908 people. The district was home to 41 percent of the state's total population. At the other end of the spectrum, the Pelican School District had the fewest people within its boundaries. Only 79 people, or 0.01 percent of the state, lived there.

Between 2010 and 2015, Alaska's population grew by 4 percent. The five school districts with the fastest growing populations in their boundaries were Matanuska-Susitna Borough (13 percent increase), Kake city (11 percent), St. Mary's city (11 percent), Lower Yukon (10 percent), and Kashunamiut (9 percent).

Canadian Areas Adjacent to Alaska

Alaskans visiting Canada or conducting business there frequently use information on areas adjacent to Alaska. Table 3.4 includes population figures for selected areas and communities in Yukon Territory and along the border of British Columbia, taken from Statistics Canada's 2006 and 2011 censuses. The adjacent areas in British Columbia (56,774 people) and the Yukon (33,897) contained 90,671 people in 2011, compared to Southeast Alaska's 2011 population of 73,702.

Alaska Native Regional Corporations

The Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act of 1971 created 12 in-state Alaska Native Regional Corporations (ANRCs) that cover the entire state except for the Annette Island Reserve, which is Alaska's only American Indian reservation. Table 3.5 shows population estimates for each regional corporation. The estimates are for the Alaska Native and American Indian population living within these regions, not shareholders.

The Alaska Native Regional Corporation areas with the largest numbers who were Alaska Native alone or in combination in 2015 were: Cook Inlet (55,040), Calista (23,109), Doyon (16,176), and Sealaska (15,861). Four of the 12 corporations had populations that were at least three-quarters Alaska Native: Calista (88 percent), NANA (84 percent), Bering Straits (80 percent), and Bristol Bay (76 percent).

Alaska Native Village Statistical Areas

The Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act of 1971 also identified 209 Alaska Native villages. Populations for these villages were first reported in the 1980 Census. For the 1990 Census, the Census Bureau changed the name to Alaska Native Village Statistical Area (ANVSA) and worked with local officials to delineate boundaries.

ANVSA designations and boundaries change with each decennial census, and may have boundaries that are the same or different from those of cities or "census designated places" (a type of statistical area delineated by the U.S. Census Bureau). In the 2000 Census there were 208 ANVSAs and Tribal Designated Statistical Areas (a category that is no longer used), and as of the 2010 Census, there were 221. (See Table 3.6.)

Chapter 4

Alaska Places

Introduction

This chapter provides population estimates through 2015 for Alaska places, including cities and “census designated places” (CDPs). Cities include all 148 of Alaska’s incorporated places that existed as of January 1, 2015.

CDPs are statistical areas delineated by the U.S. Census Bureau. They have no legal status but are based on local areas with population. Except where noted otherwise, all numbers presented here, including those for 2000, are based on 2015 geography.

Further data, including annual census tract estimates and estimates by age and sex for places of 1,000 or more people, are available on the Research and Analysis Section’s Web site (laborstats.alaska.gov).

Population by Size of Place

Figure 4.1 shows Alaska’s population by size of place and delineates those greater than and less than 2,500 people (formerly urban and rural). The places with 2,500 or more residents in 2015 are listed in order of population size in Table 4.1.

Table 4.2 provides population estimates by borough/census area and place for 2000 and 2010 through 2015. Table 4.3 lists places alphabetically with their 2000, 2010, and 2015 total populations as well as their 2010 Census Federal Information Processing Standard (FIPS) codes.

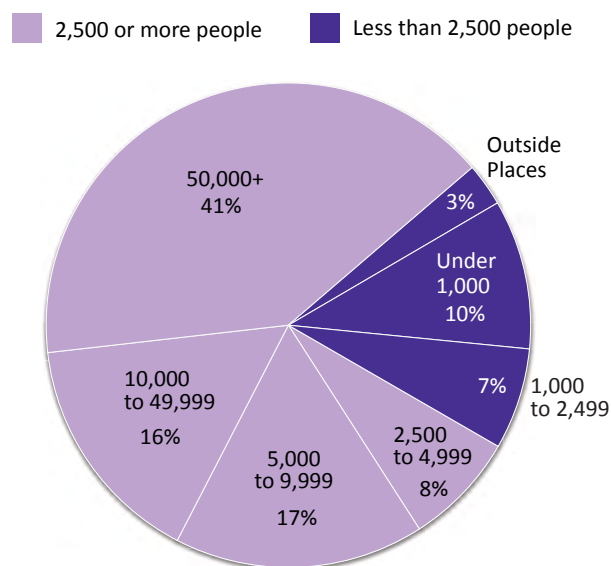
Thirty-eight places in Alaska had populations above 2,500 in 2015, and these were home to 80 percent of Alaska’s population. The Municipality of Anchorage — the state’s largest city — made up 41 percent of the overall population.

Alaska’s population living in the 316 places with fewer than 2,500 people made up 17 percent of the total population, and 3 percent of Alaskans resided outside any city or CDP. Most people living outside of a place were within a borough near a city or CDP, or along a road system.

Unorganized Territory

Slightly under three-fifths of Alaska’s land area lies outside any incorporated city or borough. In this unorganized territory,

the state performs all governmental functions.

An estimated 19,117 people, or 3 percent of the state’s population, lived in this unorganized territory in 2015; in 2010, its population was 19,392.

Back in 2000, 19,621 people, or 3 percent, lived in unorganized territory (2010 geography). In 1990 it was 23,158, or 4 percent of the population, and in 1980, it was 20,000, or 5 percent.

The majority of people living in unorganized territory reside in a CDP. The number who lived in unorganized territory outside of a CDP in 2015 was 2,096, or 0.3 percent of the state population. The 2010 Census counted 2,327 people in these areas. All but a few hundred of them lived outside communities but along a road system that allowed access to a community. Only a very small number lived in isolation on islands or in remote Alaska with access to a community only by bush plane or small boat.

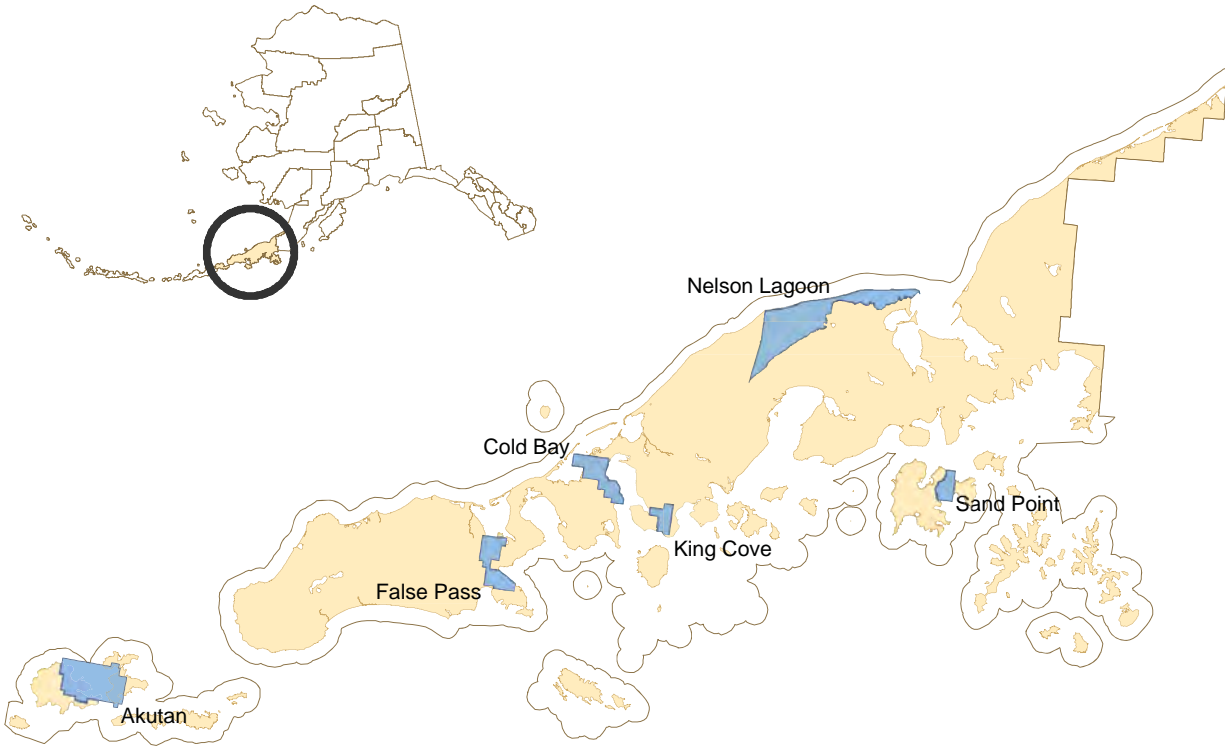

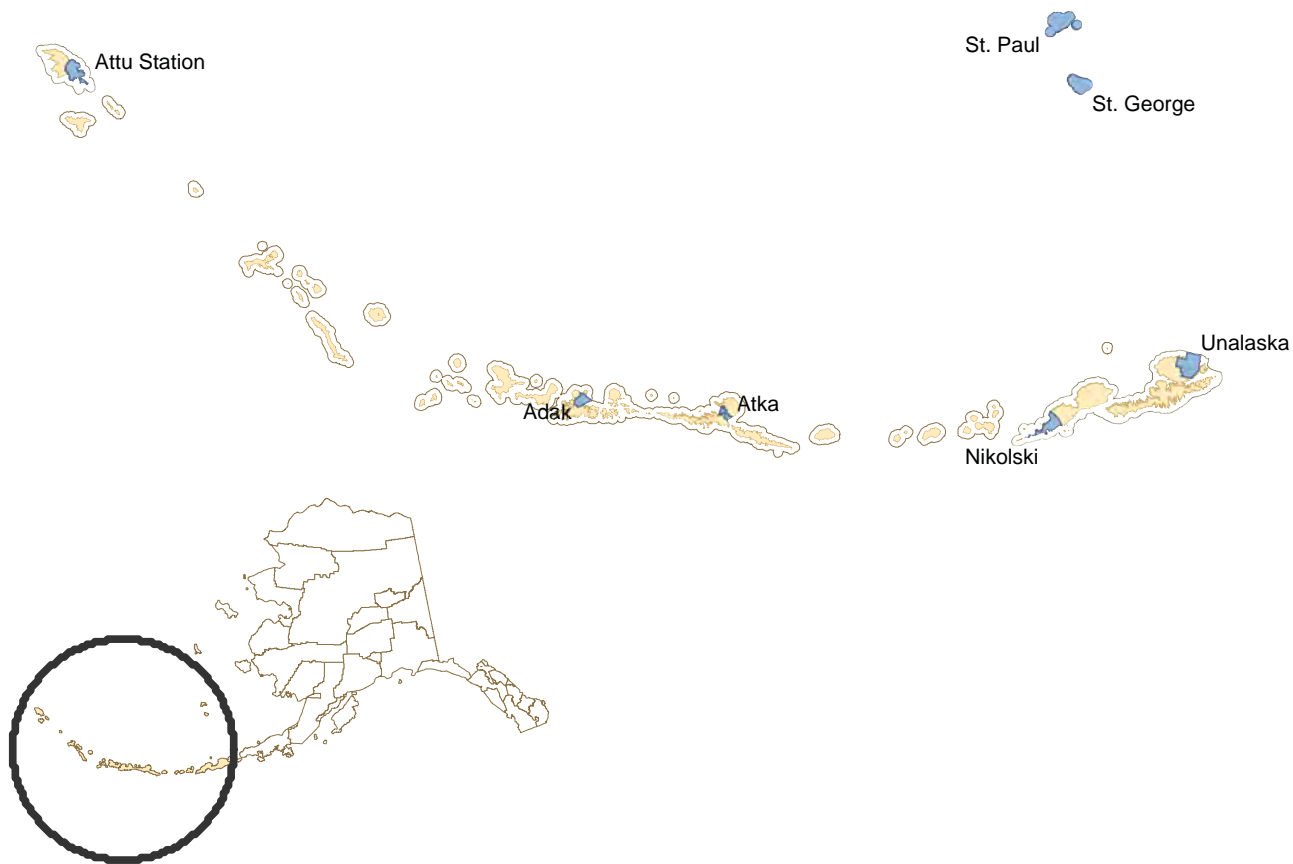

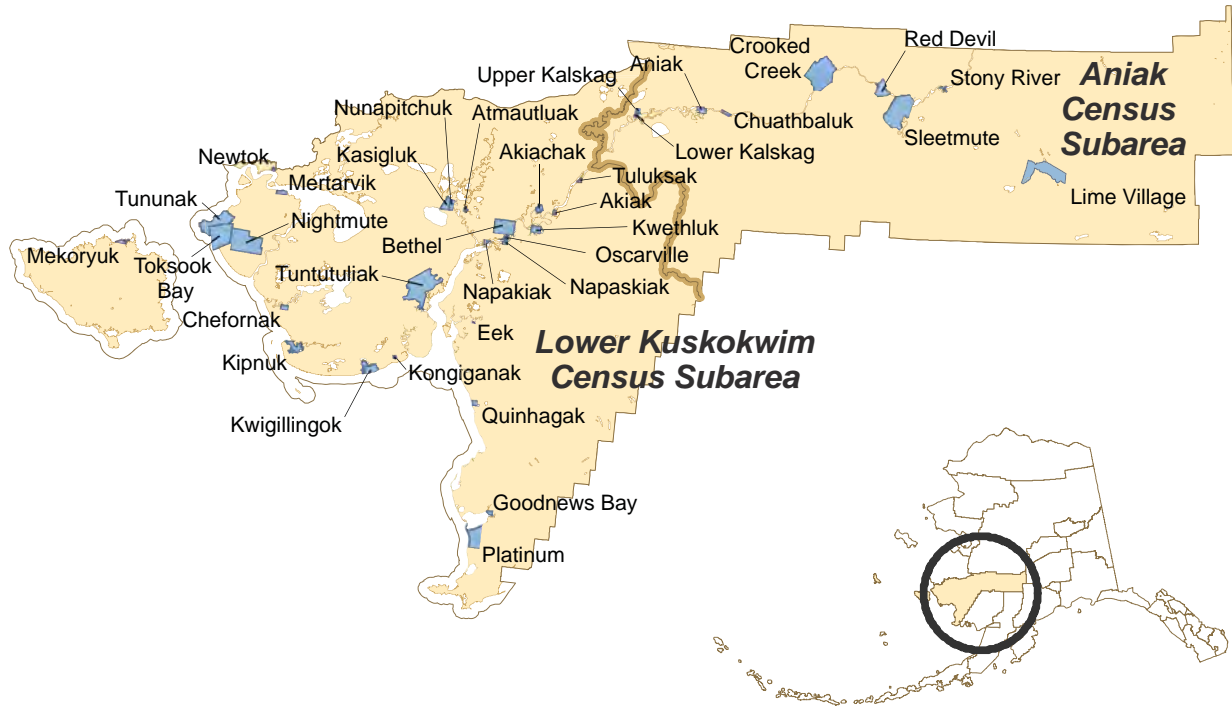

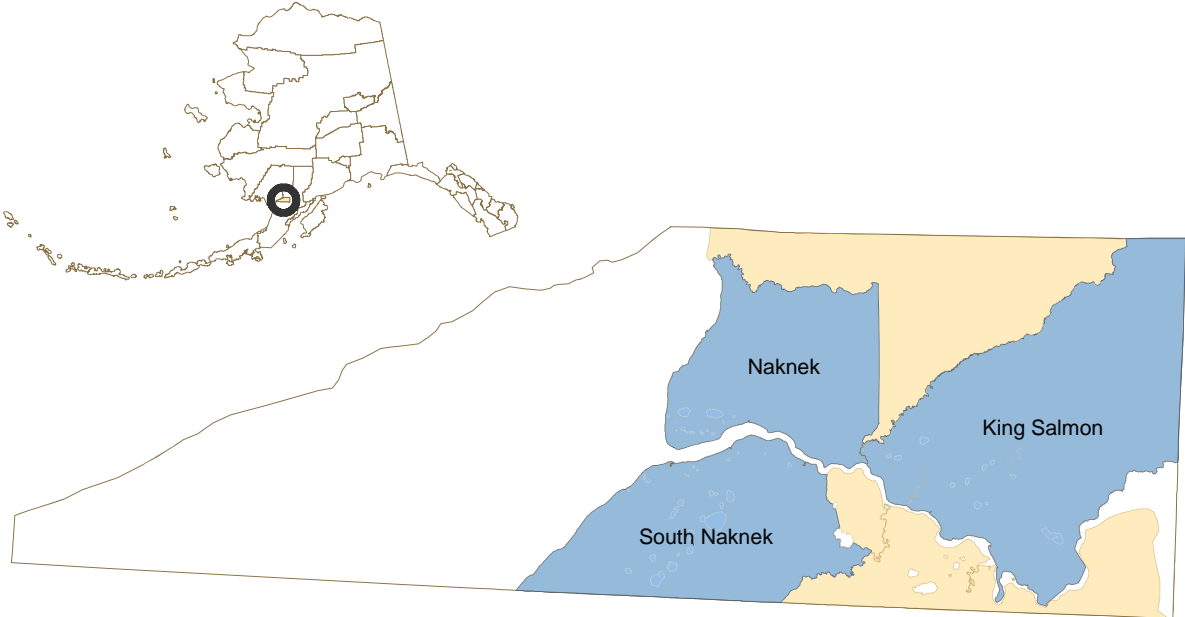

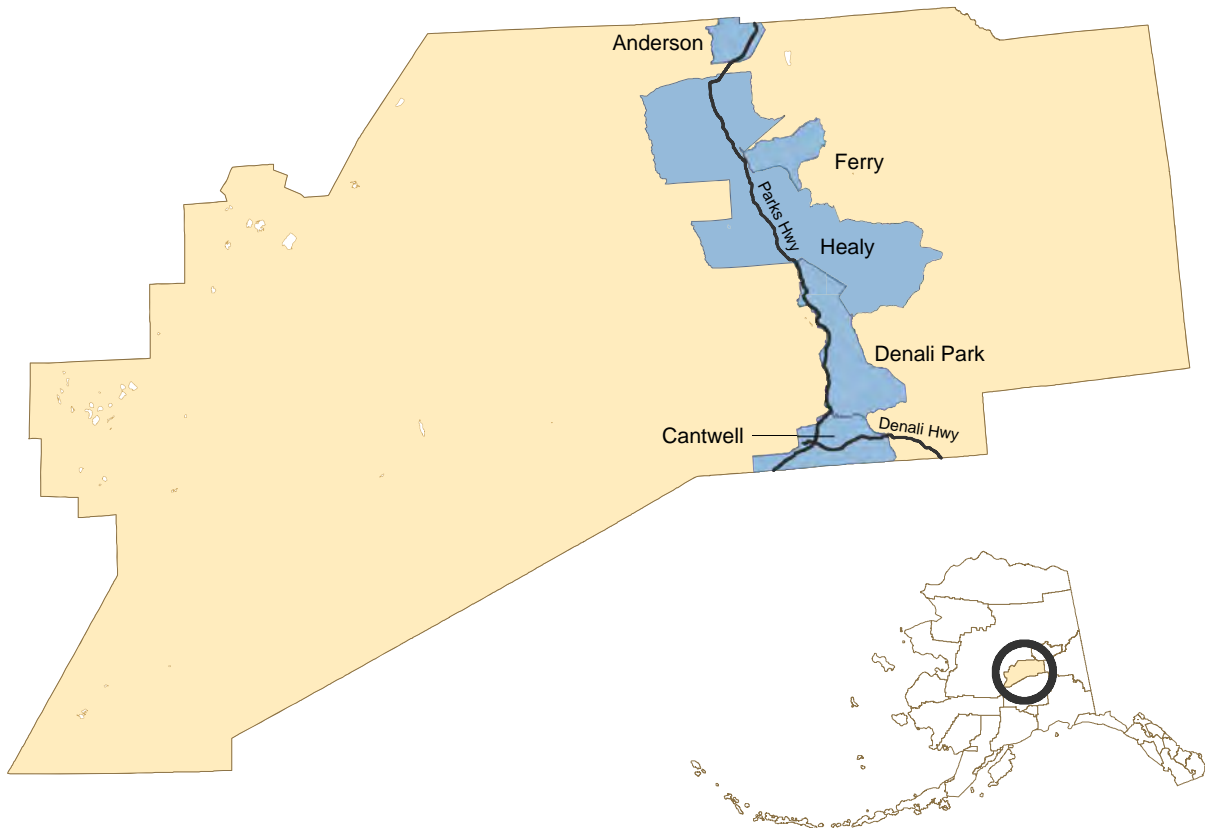

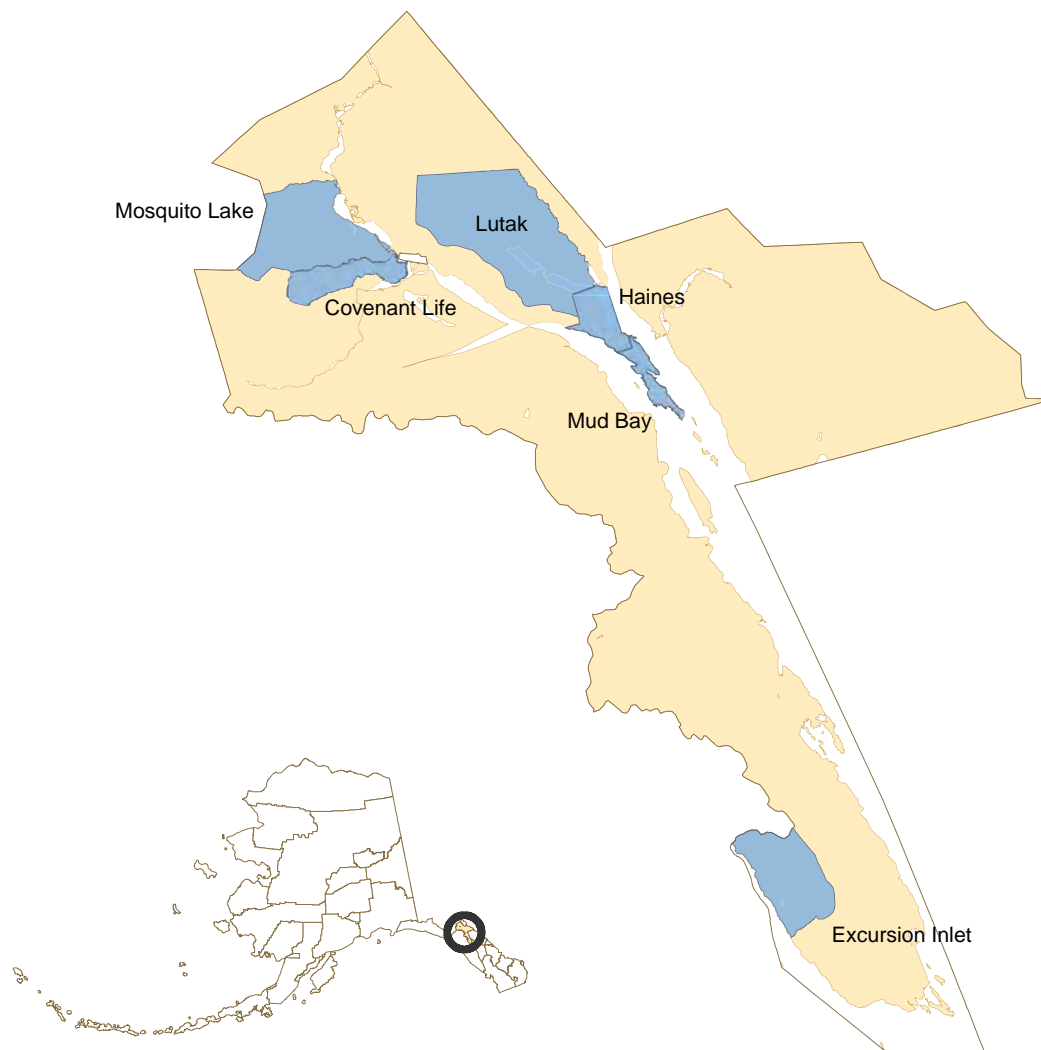

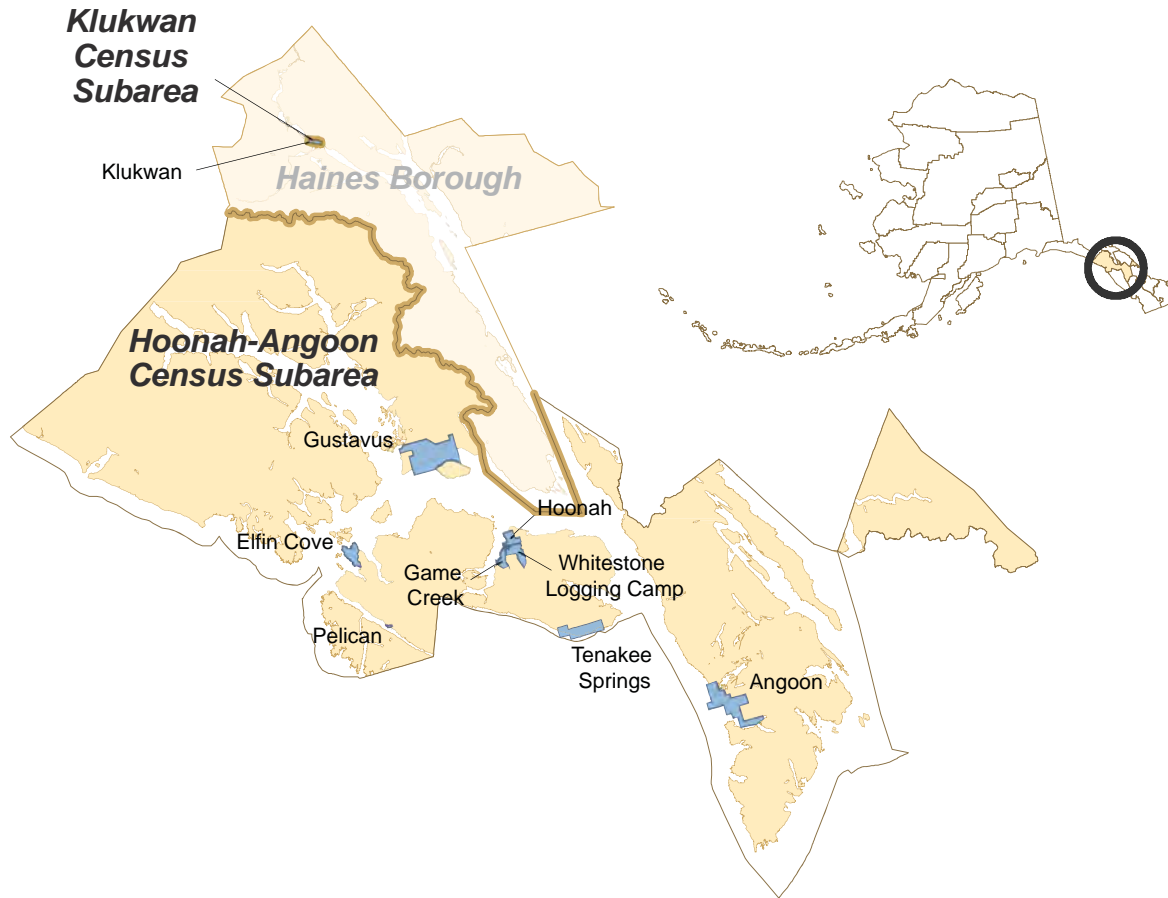

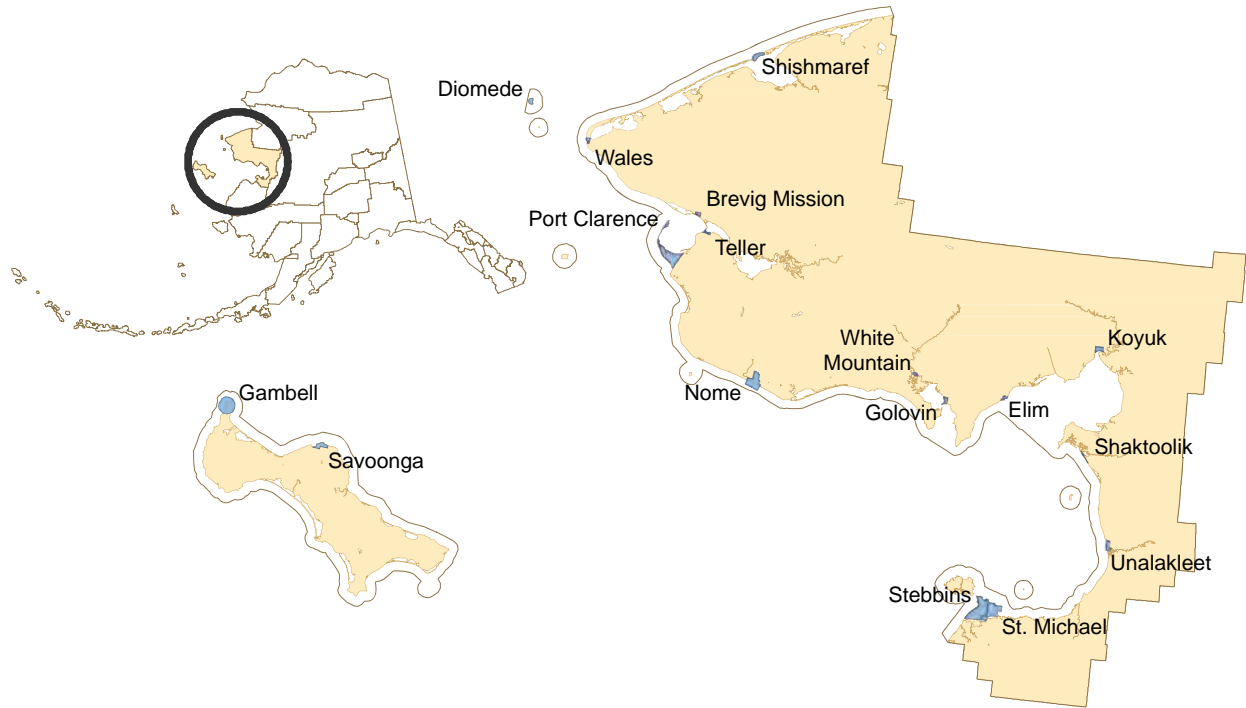

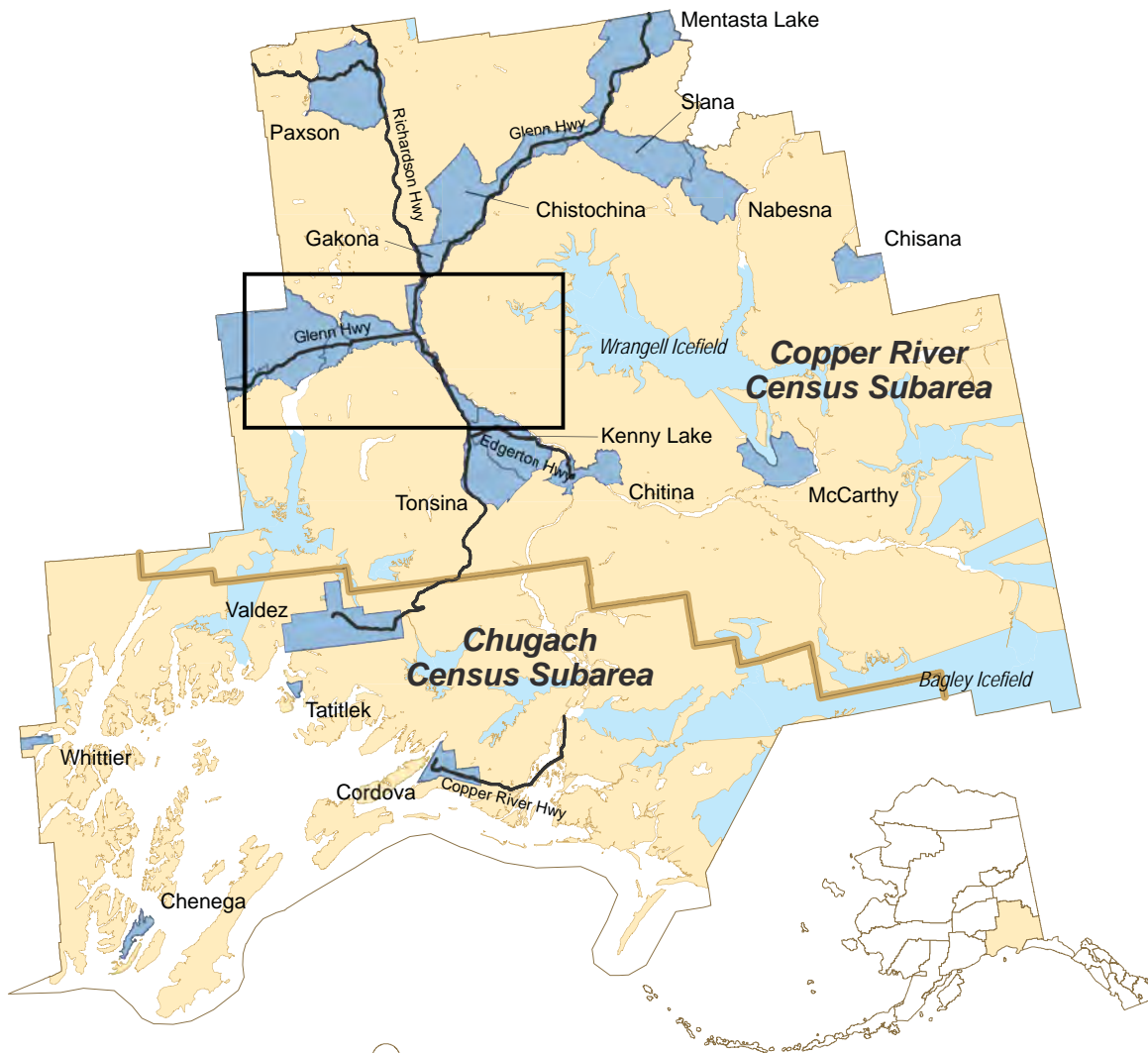

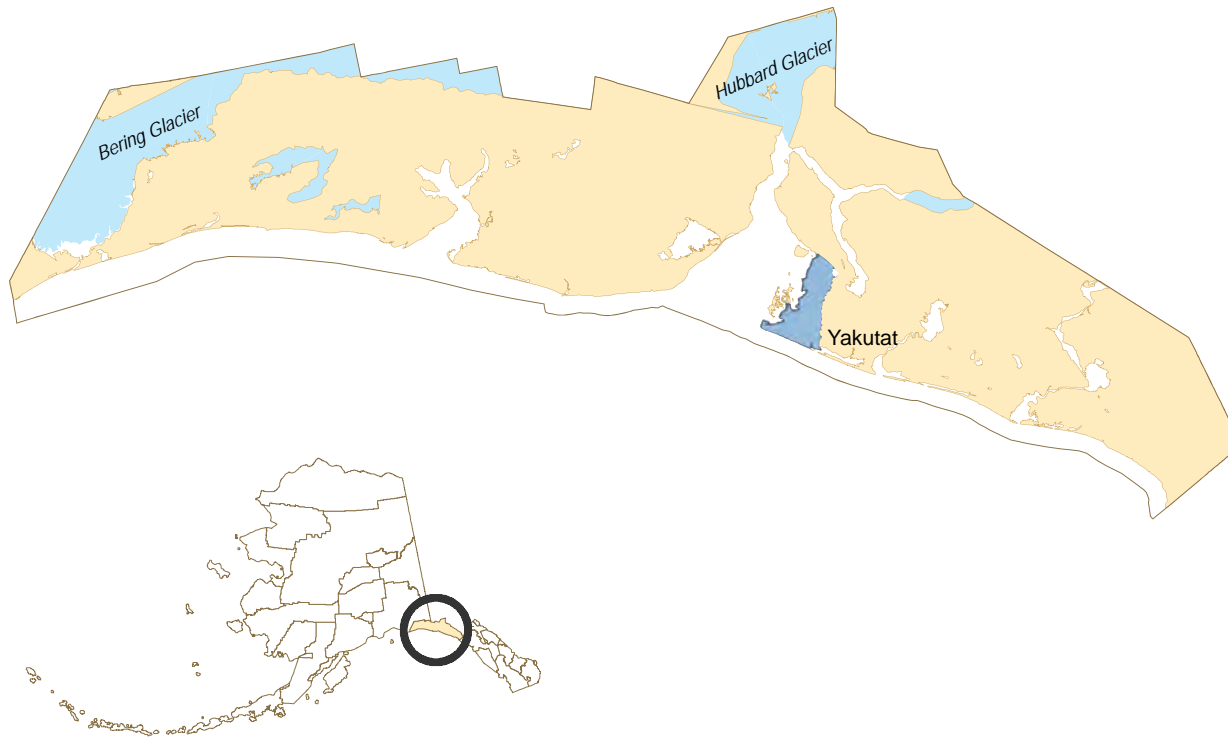

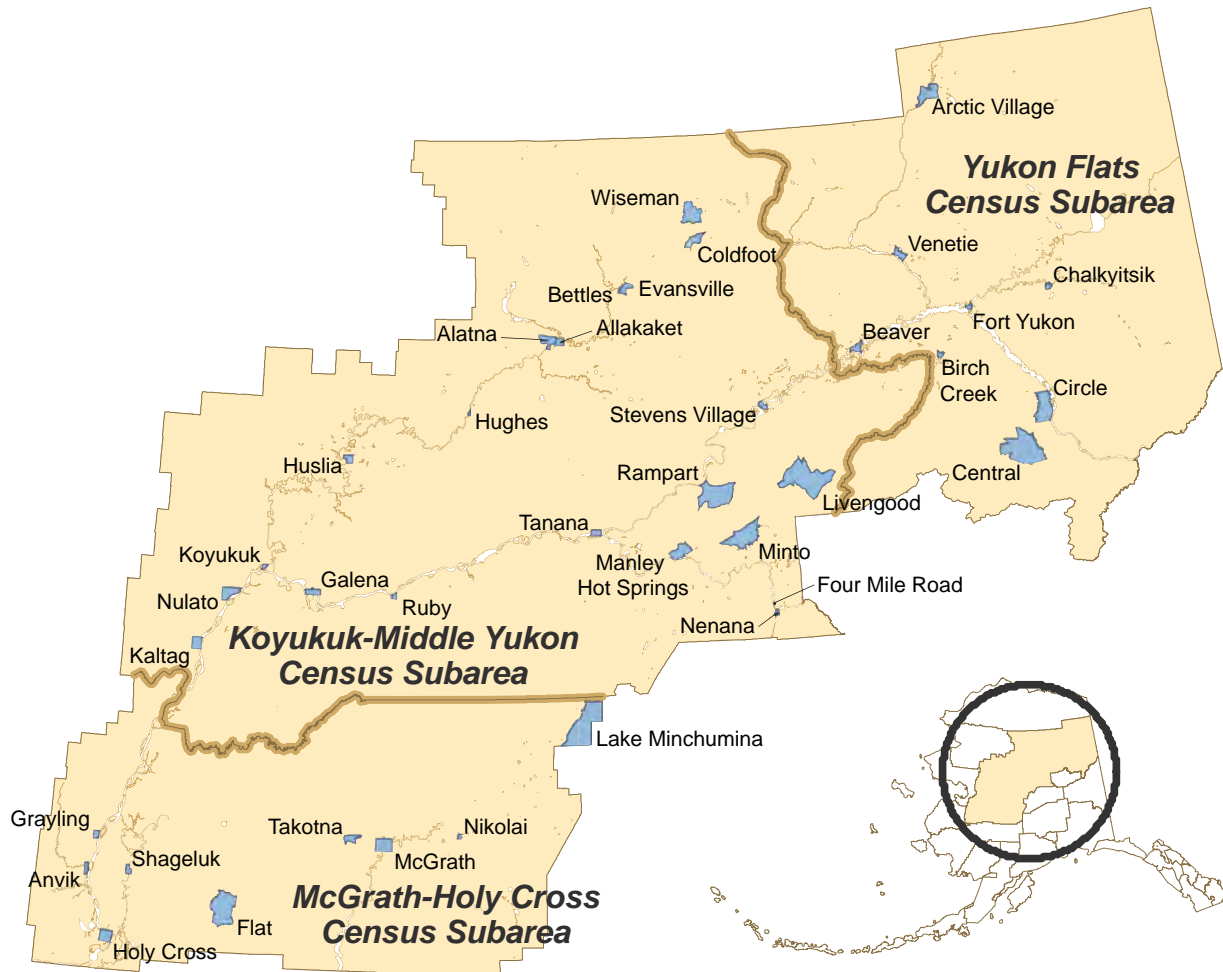
